NEW YORK, May 31.—The curb market today showed the effect of the supreme court decision in the tobacco trust case. Though there was little variation at the opening and the prices at first held close to Monday's final figures, both in American Tobacco and Standard Oil securities, there was a decided slump within the first half hour. On sales of 269 shares of American Tobacco that stock dropped to 450 bid, 460 asked, as against 510 bid and 515 asked at Monday's close.

HEAVEN'S AID INVOKED FOR RESCUE OF GIRLS

HARTFORD, Conn., May 31.—While fifty girl inmates of the house of the good shepherd were penned on the fourth floor of the building last night by flames and smoke which had shut off the stairways, the mother superior gathered 300 girls in the court yard around a statue of the Virgin and prayed for the safety of the imperiled young women.

The two engine companies which responded to the alarm had no ladders. Life nets were spread. As the nuns and girls sang "God be with you till we meet again" the young ladies, ranging in age from 15 to 21, jumped. All were rescued.

GRANTS PASS MAN FOUND DEAD IN HIS HOME

GRANTS PASS, May 31.—Dying alone in his bed, with wife and son away at North Yakima, Wash., Lemuel J. Widgen, residing at 730 North Ninth street, was found by neighbors last Monday evening, dead in his bed, he having died alone from heart failure some time Saturday night, was the opinion of the physician present at an inquest which was held late yesterday.

MEXICAN CAPTAIN SHOT AT SUNRISE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 31.—According to a report that reached San Diego from Tia Juana this morning, Captain Tony Vegas, commander of the Mexican troops under General Rhys Pryce, was shot at sunrise this morning for having shot and killed an American soldier in his command. A court martial found him guilty yesterday.

ROME, May 31.—Roland Garros, the Frenchman who was well in the lead in the Paris to Turin aeroplane race, fell this morning between Civita Vecchia, on the second leg of the flight. His plane was partially wrecked, but he suffered no serious injury.
