

LIMANTOUR IS GIVEN PRAISE

Brother of Madero Tells Part That Minister of Finance Had in Preventing Further Bloodshed in Mexican War.

JUAREZ, Mexico, May 31.—Gustave Madero, a brother of Francisco I. Madero, jr., in an exclusive statement to the United Press today, in commenting upon the success of the revolution led by his brother, gave high praise to Jose Yves Limantour, finance minister in the Diaz cabinet. Madero said: "There was little need of fighting. Our principal task was to be ready to fight and make the necessary preparations to carry on the revolution to a conclusive end in the event Diaz had not given up. "The sincerity and power of the Madero movement was fully understood in the great financial circles from the start. Most of the world's financial leaders knew months ago that the revolution was bound to be successful. "When Limantour returned from Europe three months ago he stopped in New York for the purpose of discussing the financial situation in Mexico with New York capitalists, many of whom are heavily interested in our country. Limantour apparently resided at the Plaza, but spent most of his time at the Hotel Astor. It was in his room in the Astor where the most effective work for the revolution was done. "Farther and I went to New York three times and conferred with Limantour. We told him that the richest men in Mexico were behind us and that he had better inform the world's financial interests that we were going to overthrow the Diaz dynasty. We also proved to him that he would be conferring a blessing upon our country and averting much bloodshed if he advised Diaz and the interests surrounding him that we would succeed in our undertaking. "Limantour was finally persuaded that Diaz and his reign were doomed. He told Diaz the truth about the situation. Knowing Limantour's honesty, Diaz believed him. "One of the things we feared most was the intervention of American troops. We were confident that if Americans knew our strength and resources and the certainty of our ultimate success the American government would keep hands off. "Limantour did much to let the people of the United States know the exact truth and represented us as responsible and reliable men who could be held accountable for the acts of the revolutionists. Limantour did much as a go-between; he was fair and an honest friend to both sides. "When some of my compatriots accused me of being too friendly with him after the fall of Juarez, I let it be known that I personally was willing to go still further and that my faith in him was such that I would be willing to have him named president provisional in place of De La Barra. "To Limantour we owe the fact that the insurgents had a fair field and a chance for a fair fight."

MORAN-WOLGAST GO UNDER FIRE

Same Tactics as Those Used to Stop Jeffries-Johnson Fight Employed to Stop Battle Scheduled for July 4 in San Francisco.

OAKLAND, Cal., May 31.—Employing the same tactics as were used successfully to stop the Jeffries-Johnson fight in California, the Oakland Church Federation, headed by Attorney Charles G. White, is taking steps to prevent the scheduled Wolgast-Moran bout in San Francisco July 4. Letters have been sent to Attorney General Webb and Governor Johnson, enclosing copies of the state law and accounts of the recent Wolgast-Burns battle.

Lineman Shipped East.

The body of James McLaugherty, the lineman who was electrocuted Saturday afternoon, was shipped to Hondo, Texas, Tuesday, for burial. Rev. Lucas conducted the funeral services which were held in Perl's undertaking parlors. The employees of the Rogue River Electric company contributed a beautiful floral design. The pallbearers were Frank A. Stinson, R. L. Wrigley, E. O. Erskine, A. M. Bohmert, William Waits and E. G. Henselman.

CHILD HELPS SETTLE SENTENCE UPON DADA

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 31.—When Mrs. Henry Rischard was ordered by Judge Kimmel to pronounce sentence upon her husband, charged with cruelty and failure to support, their little two year old daughter took part in the proceedings and set the head of the family free. As Mrs. Rischard hesitated in fixing punishment, the lisping "da-da" of the child was heard. Rischard hung his head, grasped the child in his arms and strode forward. "Will you do better by me, Henry?" the wife asked. "Give me another chance and I will," was the reply. The couple left the court room arm in arm.

Woman Suicides.

BOSTON, Mass., May 31.—In a fit of temporary insanity, Mrs. John Jackson of Milwaukee leaped from the window of her room on the fourth floor of the Parker house here and was instantly killed. Her husband, who was with her at the time, was unable to prevent the suicide. Mrs. Jackson had been suffering from nervous disorders recently.

Search Warrant Out.

A search warrant was sworn out by E. F. Roberts in Justice Taylor's court Wednesday morning charging one Max Bliss with stealing a stickpin from his suit case some time during Decoration day. Both men were employed on the Roguelands tract.

EXTREME FASHIONS TO BE SPURNED BY ANGELS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 31.—Adios to the hobble skirt, "23" for the peek-a-boo waist and to the city dump with the harem skirt. Police Commissioner John Hopham is peeved at the many complaints received against Broadway oglers, and today advised the women's clubs to begin a campaign against the hobble, the harem and the peek-a-boo, which, he says, invite attention and insult. "Any woman regaling herself in such apparel," said Topham today, "should expect to be greeted with 'whoops, my dear,' or similar salutations. Such apparel has a tendency to make a man 'feel frolicsome' for he looks upon the wearer in the nature of a freak. The way some women appear on the street is degrading, and if they would give a little more attention to such matters there would be fewer complaints against mashers. I am heartily in favor of a city ordinance making it a misdemeanor for a woman to appear on the streets garbed in either a hobble or a harem skirt."

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M'CLAUGHERTY SHIPPED EAST

Superintendent of Construction Expresses Regret at Death of Young Man—Said He Was 22 Years of Age—Men Are Warned.

Expressing great regret at the death of James McLaugherty, the lineman who was killed Saturday, F. F. Loder, superintendent of construction for the Rogue River Electric Company today said: "The remains of James McLaugherty, an employee of the Rogue River Electric Company, who was electrocuted while making connection to electric wires at the Opp mine last Saturday, were sent to his relatives at Hondo, Texas, the Rogue River Electric Company paying all expenses in connection therewith. "The deceased was a very careful and reliable man and well liked by all who knew him. He had been in the employ of the Rogue River Electric Company about one year. His studious attention to details and ability previously shown recommended him as a man well able to handle the work in hand. "When first employed he represented his age as 22. His general character and deportment would be a credit to a much older man. "All employees of the Rogue River Electric Company are carefully instructed as to the dangers of the work, and how to handle same, both verbally and by posters in the various sub-stations, explaining the details and nature of the work and first aid, etc., in case of accident."

William Erdman Buried.

The funeral of William Erdman was held Tuesday morning at the residence on North Central avenue, Rev. Shields having charge of the ceremonies. Interment was in I. O. F. cemetery. The pallbearers were Emil Walters, John L. Demmer, Jacob Shafer, Paul Demmer, Mat Demmer and Peter Ensele. Mr. Erdman was a veteran of the Franco-Prussian war and received numerous medals for his bravery.
