WANT COUNTY TO BUY ROAD

Petition is Being Circulated Asking That County Authorities Buy Road Over Siskiyou on Which Toll is Charged.

The old toll road over the Siskiyou Mountains is to be abolished. A petition to have the county purchase the road is being circulated among the tax payers of the county and is meeting with universal approval.

C. B. Watson, attorney at law, of Ashland was in Medford Thursday and succeeded in getting the signatures of many of the prominent business men. Nearly every tax payer in Ashland and vicinity have signed the petition and people here are very favorably impressed with Mr. Watson's efforts.

L. D. Dollarhide, the present owner of the toll road will sign away his rights for a consideration of \$2500 and will keep the road in repair for \$750 per year if his services are required. There are eleven miles of this road which will require supervision and his price is very reasonable.

This toll road was established under the old territorial laws and made a toll road. When the state was organized the old territorial laws were repealed and provided that the county might take over the road by agreement of the owner or by condemnation.

For 60 years it has been maintained on a toll basis and has been owned by Dollarhide and his family for the past 30 years. Prior to that it was owned by the Applegate family.

The line of this road has been the scene of many tragedies and in the early days stage robberies were ordinary occurrences. Many lives have been lost on it and incidents have occurred which have been the foundation of romances.

A toll gate is out of tune in these modern times and many complaints are heard from those coming up from California, when they unexpectedly bump into a toll taker.

The petition is now in the hands of Secretary Boos of the Commercial Club and any one wishing to sign it may do so by applying at the club rooms.
