Steamer Burns.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 3.—The Steamer Northwest, valued at \$1,000,000, one of the finest vessels of the Great Lakes fleet, plying between Buffalo and Duluth, was almost completely destroyed by fire early today. The Northwest, which is owned by the Northern Steamship Company, lies at the bottom of Blackwell Canal with her inner parts wrecked by the flames which were discovered shortly before 5 o'clock this morning. The fire stated, it is believed, from spontaneous combustion. It has not yet been determined whether the Northwest can be raised. The damage to the vessel is estimated at \$750,000.

Rev. Anna Shaw Barred.

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, June 3.—Supporters of aspiring women are disappointed over their failure to secure permission for Rev. Anna Shaw to preach in a church here. Norwegian bishops oppose the aspirations of women for holy orders. The question of women in the clergy has for some time agitated this country, causing considerable discussion.

MOUNTAIN-TOP CHURCH SUCCESS

Basket Service Will Be Held Soon in the House of Worship Above the Clouds on Griffin Creek Divide—Growth is Shown.

Rev. Frank Stuart, the pastor of the "church above the clouds," better known by its constituents as the Bar Creek church, has announced that the third Sunday in June will be set aside for a basket lunch service. The divide, eight miles up Griffin creek from Medford, where the mountaineers assemble each Sunday to worship God out in the pure, wholesome mountain air, is frequently the resort of picnickers from Medford. It is hoped by the hospitable Bar Creek congregation that June the 25th will be carefully marked in the calendar of picnickers for a visit to the grove on top of the mountains. A bountiful spread is promised for all visitors. Plump, tender spring chickens will be much in evidence. Bill Fields, one of Rev. Stuart's standbys, who is the undisputed authority on chickens among upper Griffin Creekers, announced that by June 25th the spring brood of chickens would be of sufficient size for a most bountiful and delicious feast. Accordingly June 25th was the day selected.

AMERICANS IN MEXICO VICTORS

Big Business Interests of This Country Backed Madero to Win Out and Consequently Will Enjoy Favors at His Hands in the Future.

PARIS, June 3.—"Big business" of America will dominate the commercial situation in Mexico under the administration of De La Barra and his successor, who will be elected in October. British financiers have been routed by American capitalists. The ambitions of Pierson and company, limited, of London, which controls vast ore and railroad interests in Mexico, to make the corporation the dominant force in Mexico has failed. Influential members of the Mexican colony here and Parisian financiers interested in Mexican projects say that the flight of Diaz and the coming departure of Limantour confirms these views. British corporations threw their influence and its millions to Diaz while the Americans backed Madero and won out.

WOMAN SEARCHING FOR HER HUSBAND

PORTLAND, Or., June 3.—After leaving home for a business trip to Winlock, H. Lesnaux, of Medford, Or., disappeared with \$600 which he was to use in the business and has not since been seen by his wife, who applied to the city authorities for help in finding her missing husband.

Some time after his departure Mrs. Lesnaux learned that her husband had met with an accident and had been taken to a Portland hospital. She has since been unable to find him. Lesnaux is described as a man of 56 years of age, weighing 150 pounds and being five feet six inches in height. He has a gray mustache and white hair. Mrs. Lesnaux is staying at the St. Charles hotel.

ANOTHER UPRISING IN CHINESE PROVINCE

ST. PETERSBURG, June 3.—An uprising which is believed to be part of a general movement against the reigning Manchou dynasty in China is reported to have occurred today in the Southern provinces of that empire. In a battle with loyal Chinese troops 300 rebels are reported slain. The losses of the government forces are not stated. Severe fighting is also reported from other points in Southern China.
