BRAZILE STRIKE GROWING RICHER

Ledge Opened 700 Feet From First Strike and is Found to Carry Splendid Values—Ore Said to be Plentiful.

GRANTS PASS, Or., June 5.—Henry Brazile, who made the rich discovery of gold on the Black Bear claim in the Red Mountain district and on which Grants Pass men and Dr. J. P. Reddy of Medford hold an option of six months, was in Grants Pass yesterday and reports that he has made further rich discoveries on the claim.

Brazile stated that he has opened the ledge 700 feet from the original discovery and that he has exposed a ledge six feet wide carrying gold.

Asked if the new opening was as rich as the first discovery, Brazile replied: "It is richer."

The holders of the option have had men at work prospecting the claim, and the belief is that a rich property will develop.
