EMPLOYED MEN TO BURN HIS FACTORY CHICAGO, Ill., June 6.—After confessing that he had employed eight members of the "fire ring" to burn his factory, Leopold Dreyfuss, a rich manufacturing tailor, went into the bedroom of his magnificent Michigan boulevard home today and shot and killed himself. Dreyfuss was arrested on a charge of arson, following a fire in his factory Saturday night. His confession involves "fire bugs" and prominent business men who had employed them. He named the men whom he said had set fire to his factory. He asserted he had paid \$500 cash and promised \$1500 additional when he collected his insurance.

BUILDING "SUN HOUSE" WHICH WILL REVOLVE BEVERLY, Mass., June 6.—Mrs. Louise Letter, the Chicago millionaire and society woman, is having built for herself here a unique revolving "sun house." The sun house is octagon in shape, its walls almost entirely of glass. It is built upon delicate bearings and the touch of a button will move it around.

TO PROSECUTE STEEL TRUST

White House Announces That Action Against Steel Trust Will Be Started This Summer—Smith to Submit Report.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6.—Following the beginning of an investigation at Chicago of the lumber trust, it was learned at the White House today that the steel trust will be the next combination in restraint of trade to be attacked by the government. Action against the steel trust is to begin this summer. Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of the bureau of corporations will soon submit to President Taft the report of his bureau's investigation into the business and methods of the United States Steel corporation.

TAFT AND ROOSEVELT BOTH HONOR GIBBONS

BALTIMORE, Md., June 6.—William Howard Taft, president of the United States, and Theodore Roosevelt, his predecessor, joined with the civic authorities of Baltimore today to pay honor to James Cardinal Gibbons. The occasion of the celebration was the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Gibbons as a priest and the 25th anniversary of his elevation to the cardinalate. Hundreds of prominent men joined in the city's tribute to the cardinal, among them being Chief Justice White of the United States supreme court, James Schoolcraft Sherman, vice president of the United States and Governor Crothers of Maryland. A monster meeting was held in the Fifth regiment armory in the afternoon where both Taft and Roosevelt were scheduled to pay their tributes to Gibbons. The cardinal himself was among the speakers.

WALKS WHILE ASLEEP INTO SPACE; KILLED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 6.—Walking into space from the fourth story of an unfinished building, William Meyers, 50, somnambulist, crashed to the sidewalk and was killed today. Meyers, a saloon porter, left his lodgings while fast asleep this morning and, clad in his pajamas, went to the saloon where he had been employed. He swept out the saloon, polished the bar, washed the glasses and then, still soundly sleeping, walked out of the place. A policeman, attracted by Meyers' white garments, followed him and saw that he was walking in his sleep. Meyers climbed into an unfinished building, the officer following, but fearing to wake him for fear he might fall. Suddenly Meyers turned and walked out of an opening on the fourth floor.

DANIEL O'REILLY FOUND GUILTY; TO JAIL SOON

NEW YORK, June 6.—Daniel O'Reilly, one of Harry Thaw's counsel at his trial for killing Stanford White, will probably be taken to Blackwell's Island today to serve five months' sentence for receiving stolen property. O'Reilly was convicted in connection with the robbery of Aaron Bancroft, broker, of \$87,000 in securities.

NEW YORK, June 6.—It is utterly impossible for New York to enforce her Sunday liquor laws by detaining a policeman to watch every saloon in the city. Why? Because there are not enough policemen to go around. The following letter from Mayor Gaynor to the Rev. Gove G. Johnson, of the Alexander Avenue Baptist church, sets forth the difficulties of the remedial plan suggested by the preacher: "There are 11,770 liquor places in this city and 10,000 policemen. What would you have me do—put a policeman at the door of every liquor place on Sunday? There are not enough to go around and what would become of the city, if the police were all put on that duty? I fear you have not thought the whole case out as I am obliged to do. I thank you for helping us while other people are railing at us."
