COLORADO TO MARKET VERY HEAVY CROP

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange under date of June 5 say: Since our last bulletin on apple crop conditions, there have not been many very important changes. A report from Kansas has reached us, to the effect that worms and insect pests are ravaging the apple orchards, and that the canker worm is particularly active and persistent. Growers are reported as working feverishly in spraying over and over to rid themselves of the pests. Reports from the border counties of Oklahoma state that the farmers are greatly disturbed over the appearance of the Army worm. Otherwise, reports from all districts from Utah to Virginia, and from Nova Scotia to New Mexico, indicate an exceedingly heavy bloom. Of course, a heavy bloom is not necessarily a heavy crop, but in the present prospects mature, there will be a record crop of apples, taking the production as a whole, without reference to any one region.

From Ontario comes the first apparently authentic report of conditions in the Niagara fruit belt which predicts a record breaking crop. It is stated that if every tenth blossom bears fruit the crop will be unusually large, so thick are the blossoms. The exchange has a report from Mr. Clinton L. Oliver, secretary of the American Apple congress, who characterizes Colorado crop conditions as "the best in years," on his return from a personal trip of survey and estimate throughout every district on the western slope and the eastern slope as well.
