SEE REBUKE FOR PRESIDENT'S PLAN

Election of Green in Iowa to Congress Said to Indicate Repudiation of Reciprocity Plan of President Taft.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, June 7.—Complete returns from the special congressional election in the Ninth District today increase the plurality of Judge W. R. Green (Republican) over W. A. Cleveland (Democrat) to 1,450. "Regular" Republicans say the result indicates a repudiation of President Taft's reciprocity policy, while the progressives claim that few farmers voted. During the campaign Green spoke against Canadian reciprocity, while his democratic opponent warmly advocated the adoption of the proposed treaty.

Democratic leaders declare the farmers are disgusted with both factions of the republican party. The special election was held to select a successor to Walter I. Smith appointed federal district judge.

\$20,000 REWARD FOR KILLING OF GONZALES

EL PASO, Texas, June 7.—Abram Gonzales, whom Madero selected as governor of Chihuahua, stated today that he had received a private telegram from Chihuahua that a reward of \$20,000 has been offered to any one who will kill him. Gonzales declared that he was going to Chihuahua to assume the office.

Madero's confidential agents here have been notified that Adolfo Galan has been arrested at Ciudad Porfirio Diaz in connection with the DeVillars plot against Madero. Galan is said to be an associate of Rosendo Pineda, the congressman accused of having fathered the plot.

Those in Juarez still loyal to the old federal government are awaiting the next move of General Bernardo Reyes. The Mexican consul at El Paso is making arrangements with the Southern Pacific Company to transport 1100 soldiers, who are being ordered to Lower California to drive out the liberals there.

HAVANA, June 7.—The work of pumping water from the coffer dam built around the wreck of the United States battleship Maine in Havana harbor was continued today. United States naval officers are in charge of raising the wrecked warship.

EAST BOOSTS FOR HOME PRODUCTS

Great Sentiment Favoring East Against West is Formed by C. E. Whistler on Trip Through Middle Western States.

C. E. Whistler of this city has just returned from an extensive trip through Colorado, Iowa and other apple producing states of the middle west. Mr. Whistler admits that he has been deeply impressed with the prospects for a very heavy crop which must be marketed in competition with northwestern fruits. His idea is that Colorado will produce a crop equally as large as in 1909, when the output was something in the neighborhood of 5000 cars of apples. He also reports heavy crops in other districts mentioned.

Mr. Whistler was impressed by the anti-western spirit which prevails in many of the eastern and middle western consuming centers. He referred to a campaign which is now on foot in Iowa to promote the sale of Iowa products, and he regards it as certain that if Iowa produces a crop of apples this year at all commensurate with her needs, the Iowa commercial bodies will do everything possible to encourage the growing sentiment to confine consumption to commodities produced within the state.

Mr. Whistler states it as his opinion that a different situation confronts the northwestern producers this year than for a long time past. He feels that it behooves all to watch the entire situation closely, remembering that values are based on the whole supply and demand, not only of the commodity itself but of competing commodities. In other words, the self competition of apples from different districts bananas, etc.

MAY AMEND PURE FOOD, DRUG BILL

Will Change Law to Nullify Defect Found by Supreme Court Recently—Senator McCumber to Father Measure.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—A number of senators who desire to amend the pure food and drug act of 1906 so it may apply to misstatements concerning the curative effects of medicines, particularly patent medicines will confer in the near future in regard to the introduction of such a measure. It is probable that Senator McCumber of North Dakota will father the amendment. The measure is intended to prohibit any misstatements concerning the curative effects of medicines and it is said will be designed to offset the United States supreme court's recent decision which held the law did not prohibit such mis-statements.

An amendment would have been introduced sooner but the dissenting opinion of Justice Hughes could not be secured and many desired to read it before constructing the amendment.
