

COLVIG REMAINS AS PRESIDENT

IS Forced to Reconsider His Recent Action in Resigning—Much Business is Transacted at Regular Meeting.

Judge William M. Colvig has reconsidered his resignation as president of the Commercial club and will occupy the chair until such time as some one can be secured to take his place. This was the substance of Mr. Colvig's speech to the members of the Commercial club at the meeting of that body in the ready association rooms Wednesday evening. He stated that his business interests required a great deal of his time and that he would remain as president only until a successor could be chosen.

Twelve new members were taken into the organization and a communication from the Ashland Commercial club regarding the purchase of the Siskiyou toll road by the county was endorsed by a unanimous vote.

A proposition to induce the government to make an appropriation for the harbor improvements at Crescent City was endorsed and a motion that the Medford Commercial club give its support to the proposition was carried.

A communication from the Central Labor council concerning cheap foreign labor was read but as no representative of the council was present to discuss the matter the communication was referred to later consideration.

The policy of the club in answering communications from outside parties in regard to investments, etc., was discussed and the agricultural show to be held here this fall received some attention. It is planned to have the exhibition, known as a pen show instead of an apple or fruit show and thus distinguish it from the numerous shows of the same character held in other fruit growing districts.

A vote of thanks was rendered to Nichols and Ashpole for the use of the Angle opera house at the round-up; to C. H. Pierce for the floral decoration and the Palmer Piano House for the use of the piano.

George Cuthbert and B. Klun were elected to fill the chairs vacated by resignations of the directors.

ANOTHER BIG PASSENGER STEAMER IS ORDERED

BELFAST, Ireland, June 8.—Determined that the supremacy of trans-Atlantic travel in the matter of grandeur and speed, shall not be wrested from Germany, the Hamburg-American line has given orders for a new liner 950 feet in length which will be the biggest ship in the world and surpass the White Star liner Olympic. The latter is 888½ feet in length, 60,000 tonnage, and will make her maiden voyage the latter part of this month or early in July.

Taft Reviews Children.

NEW YORK, June 8.—Between 75,000 and 80,000 children, it is estimated, were reviewed today by President Taft as they marched in the annual parade of the Brooklyn Sunday School union. Every president of the United States since Grant has reviewed such a parade, but the one which passed before President Taft today broke all records.

Tonight the president will be the guest of honor at the banquet to be given by the New York Produce Exchange in honor of the cottonseed crushers of the south, who are in convention here this week.

No Strike Necessary.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 8.—That the teamsters' demand for shorter hours will be settled without a strike was the statement today of President Michael Casey of the Brotherhood of Teamsters.

GOLDEN STATE MEN GREETED

California Business Men Are Shown About City in Automobiles—Express Themselves as Surprised at Growth of City.

The Golden State excursion party, composed of business men from Santa Barbara, Los Angeles, San Francisco and other California points, together with their families, were entertained by Medford business men and members of the Commercial club Wednesday afternoon. They were met at the depot by a reception committee and taken through the orchard districts lying south of Medford and through a portion of the southwest section of the city.

As the excursionists alighted from the coaches they were met by a number of flower girls, who presented them with bouquets of roses. Judge Colvig, president of the Commercial club, in a short speech welcomed them to Medford, setting forth the advantages of the town and country. He touched on the amount of building and paving done in the past four years and stated that he had been delegated to speak because they "wanted somebody who could tell the truth." This was greeted with cheers and laughter and the party hastened to the automobiles.

The route led south on Oakdale avenue, circling the Hill orchard, and passed through the Bear Creek, Burnett or Eden Valley, and foothill orchards. On the return a short spin was taken on West Main street, but had to be cut short, as the train only stopped one hour.

The visitors were very enthusiastic over the city and the orchards surrounding it and said the time had been very profitably employed. A number are planning to return to the valley at some time when they have time to make a more thorough investigation.

The party traveled in a special train of five Pullman coaches and numbered 42 members. Fifteen automobiles were required to transport them on the tour and but for the short time allowed a more extensive idea about the city would have been given them.

BRAZIL CAN'T COMPETE WITH CALIFORNIA ORANGES

NEW YORK, June 8.—Among fruit men here it is generally agreed that the experiment of shipping oranges from Brazil to compete with the California product in market has proved a flat failure. One hundred boxes, which arrived in fair condition after a 14 days' transit were sold for \$1 per box and had to be peddled by push cart men, mostly on the lower East Side.

In the same consignment were 120 packages of grapes resembling the California Tokay. They were condemned by the health department, being too watery for transportation from such a distance.

Wilson On Junket.

DETROIT, Mich., June 8.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson today sailed with the Detroit board of commerce on a cruise of the lakes. At various stops Secretary Wilson will advocate the cause of reciprocity.

SAYS WOOL MEASURE WILL NEVER PASS

PENDLETON, Or., June 8.—According to a letter just received here by the secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers' association, from Dr. S. W. McClure, secretary of the National Wool Growers' association, woolmen have nothing to fear from the present progress in connection with the proposed downward revision of the wool schedule. McClure's letter states that Underwood's wool measure "is looked upon as a joke," and asserts it will never pass. He writes: "I have gone over the situation at Washington very carefully and feel safe in assuring your wool growers that there will be no legislation affecting the tariff passed at the present session of congress. The bill as introduced by the democrats is looked upon as a joke, for it represents no theory of political economics, as it affects neither free trade, revenue nor protection.

"The bill should not affect the wool market, for it will never become a law."

TO REPORT SOON ON RECIPROCITY

Will Offer Bill as Outlined by Taft Together With the Root Amendment but Without Recommendation—Think Amendment Deadly.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 8.—

The senate finance committee today agreed to report Tuesday the reciprocity agreement, with the Root amendment, without recommendation. The Root amendment, which is opposed by President Taft, provides that the pulp paper and the print paper clause shall become effective when all Canadian provinces agree to free exportation of these products. The original agreement provides that reciprocity in this respect shall become immediately effective, with such provinces as now permit exportation. The backers of reciprocity say that the amendment would effectually block the agreement as far as print and pulp paper go, because it is asserted, Quebec province would never accept unrestricted exportation.
