CHECK SIGNED BY "MRS. TAFT" IS PRESENTED

BERKELEY, Cal., June 9.—Visions of the invasion of Berkeley by the families of Rockefeller and Taft were rudely shattered today when Edward Lynn, real estate agent, found that two checks, one for \$250, signed by "Mrs. Taft," were not negotiable. The first check was given Lynn by a woman as a deposit on 200 acres of land in North Berkeley. When the same woman appeared later with a check purporting to be signed by the wife of the president, Lynn started an investigation.

Made \$8455 a Mile.

SALEM, June 9.—In a report filed with the state tax commissioner the Oregon & California railroad shows gross earnings of \$9,082,499, with the operating expenses amounting to \$4,727,380. The total income was \$4,355,118, while the taxes amounted to \$369,467, as against \$298,531 paid the year previous. The net earnings per mile for this road were \$6455.

The Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company's gross earnings during 1910 were \$1,561,309 and the operating expenses \$1,291,938. The total cost of the properties of the company in Oregon was \$5,489,881. The taxes last year were \$52,428, against \$40,100 for the year before. The total income of the company is placed at \$359,371.

JAPANESE TRUCK GARDENERS COME

First Colony of Little Brown Men in Rogue River Valley Lease Forty Acres for Truck Farming on the Old Anderson Place.

Japanese truck gardeners have made their appearance in the valley for the first time in its history, says the Valley Record.

M. Hiroko has leased 40 acres from George A. Morse on Anderson creek, the old E. K. Anderson place, and there are six Japanese working the place, the entire 40 acres being planted to tomatoes and cabbage. Hiroko is being assisted by his uncle, who is an experienced gardener, having worked in California for several years. Hiroko is not an experienced gardener, having been engaged in mining at Nome, Alaska, until this season.

Mr. Morse, who was in Ashland yesterday, reports that he receives \$15 per acre rental for the season, and that in addition the Japanese also take care of his 1-year-old trees. Mr. Morse says that this is a valuable item, as he not only gets his 40 acres of growing trees cared for, but gets return from his land as well. "The principal object," remarked Mr. Morse, "that induced me to rent the land was for the purpose of demonstrating what can be done with the land by truck farming. Anderson creek is a fine stream for truck farming and it will prove its value this season."

Mr. Morse says the lease is for this season only and he knows of no other parties in the valley that are leasing lands to Japanese. He does not believe that the Japanese will come into Rogue River valley in any considerable number on account of the opportunities for obtaining irrigated land suitable for truck farming in the manner they engage in it are limited.

EIGHT HOUR LAW FOR WOMEN IN EFFECT

SEATTLE, Wash., June 9.—This morning, department stores in Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane and throughout the state opened at 9 o'clock instead of 8. It was the start of the eight hour day, in compliance with the new law for women workers passed at the last session of the legislature. Of course this law effects women in all kinds of work. Five thousand women will be benefited in Seattle.

Miss Blanche Mason, assistant state labor commissioner, said today that she believed there will be no friction in the enforcement of the law, and that it will mean no material reduction in wages.
