

BOURNE NOW "NEAR-PROPHET"

Discussing Reported Split in Republican Ranks He Outlines Method of Telling Who Will Be Next Presidential Candidate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 9.—Discussing the reported split in the ranks of the progressives in the senate today, Senator Jonathan Bourne of Oregon delivered a near-prophecy an dwitout mentioning names outlined a method for telling who would be the next presidential nominee.

"The apparent efforts of some newspapers to mislead the people by conveying the idea that there will be no protest to the re-nomination of President Taft is the most asinine and idiotic peanut politics ever indulged in," he said. "I would suggest to newspaper editors and reporters that they propound these questions to the first 100 republicans they happen to meet:

"Who'll be the nominee of the next republican convention? Second, 'Who'll be president?' Then on the assumption that no convention ever nominates a man whom the delegates inevitably believe will be defeated, see what conclusion they'll come to regarding who will be the republican nominee."

NEW YORK, June 5.—Acting on information furnished by some mysterious person, said to be a discharged employe, of Lucille, Ltd., a large dressmaking concern at No. 17 West Thirty-sixth street, United States Marshal Henkel and several customs officials made a raid on the place and seized a number of gowns, chiefly imported models, which are alleged to have been brought to this country by misrepresentations as to value.

The government alleges that it did not receive the full duty which should have been paid. An examination is now being made of the customs house records of all the importations of Lucille, Ltd., since the firm was organized two years ago, to determine to what extent alleged undervaluation has been practiced.

Lady Duff-Gordon, wife of Sir George Edmund Duff-Gordon, is named in the corporation directory for the current year as president of and a director in the corporation, although it was stated for her that under a re-organization, which took place about six months ago, she ceased to be an official of the company and merely served in the capacity of a designer.

Members of the jury today appeared before Judge Landis and informed him that the documentary evidence now received is so great that there is no room in the present quarters. It is reported that many of the documents were secured through subpoenas duces tecum from the office of Frederick Weyerhaeuser.

Landis adjourned to the quarters used by Judge Kohlsaat and permitted the jurors to use his courtroom.
