

DICK FERRIS IS "IN BAD"

Must Tell Grand Jury All About His Little Plan to Grab Lower California and Set Up Independent Republic.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 10.—Richard Ferris, amusement promoter and actor, who recently turned down an offer to become permanent president of the "republic of Lower California" is "in bad" today with Attorney General Wickersham. The attorney general wants to know to what extent Ferris has been forwarding the movement of establishing an independent republic there, and Ferris has been served with subpoena to tell the grand jury all he knows about the movement. The government fears that Ferris may have violated a few neutrality laws and it wants further information concerning an advertisement Ferris inserted in various newspapers calling for 1,000 armed men to aid in the work of taking Lower California from Mexico.

Ferris must tell all he knows about the movement to the grand jury. He will be questioned by United States district attorney. In a statement today Ferris said that the government will not be able to prove anything against him.

HENRY GEORGE MAKES SINGLE TAX SPEECH

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—Henry George, jr., elected to congress from New York at the last election today favored "single tax" in a speech in the house. He said he favored the Underwood reciprocity bill because it was a step in the right direction. He believed in absolute free trade in everything, he said. He declared the income tax unfair.

Peacocks Flee.

PASADENA, Cal., June 10.—Two peacocks are missing today from their quarters in the beautiful Busch Gardens. Attendants believe that they were not content with their surroundings and it is believed that they have strayed away to the less artificial wilds of the Arroyo Seco.

CHINA TO DEMAND HUGE INDEMNITY

Ten Millions of Dollars are Wanted by Flowery Kingdom for Killing of 300 of its Subjects at Toveon—Much Concern Felt.

MEXICO CITY, June 10.—Reports that China will demand \$10,000,000 indemnity for the killing of 309 Chinese at Toveon have caused the government on concern today. Insinuations that a Chinese gunboat would be sent to enforce the claim were greeted with polite smiles in official circles. Shung Nai Sun, charge d'affaires at the Chinese legation, admitted that he had forwarded to the Peihai government a full report on the Toveon affair.

SAYS FULL PENALTY SHOULD BE GIVEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—Admitting that the full penalty should have been inflicted in the sugar trust weighing fraud cases, Federal Attorney Wise of New York discussed the sugar prosecutions before the house committee on expenditures in the department of justice.

"The policy of the government," he said, "in those cases was fixed before I became district attorney. I do not wish to reflect upon anyone but I may say that I have exacted my pound of flesh in every instance in which I have been concerned." Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war former United States district attorney in New York preceded Wise. He said that H. O. Havemeyer had undoubtedly known of the frauds and if he had lived could have been indicted and convicted.

Married.

BAKER STARTS ANOTHER CASE

Complaint is Made to Interstate Commerce Commission That Railroads are Discriminating Against Eastern Oregon Towns.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—The commercial club of Baker City, Or., complained to the interstate commerce commission today that Oregon-Washington Railway and Navigation company, the Oregon Short Line and the Pacific & Idaho Northern railroad were discriminating against Baker in joint rates to points in Idaho and Oregon.

Aeroplane Accident.

TOKYO, June 10.—The first serious accident to mar the success of the military aeroplane experiments at the Tokosawa aviation grounds occurred this morning, when two officers were injured.

After sailing 24 miles a Blériot monoplane, carrying Captain Tokugawa of the army and sub-lieutenant Ito of the navy, suddenly fell to earth, injuring both aviators. Fortunately the monoplane was not high in the air when the accident occurred, and neither occupant was fatally injured. Lieutenant Ito's left arm was broken.

Four Down.

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 10.—Mrs. B. C. Tanner, her two boys, and Annie Course yesterday, aged 10, are dead here today, the result of attempting to save Pearl Coursey, aged 8, from drowning. All were on a Sunday school picnic along the banks of the Boxcie river. Little Pearl was out a bit too far and the current swept her off her feet.

In making attempts to reach Pearl, Mrs. Tanner, her two boys, and Annie Coursey are swept out in mid-stream and drowned. Pearl caught hold of a stump after they were all in the water and saved herself.

Youngsters to Ride Again.

NEW YORK, June 10.—Temple and Louie Abernathy are due to arrive here today to make preparations for a transcontinental ride on the same ponies they rode last summer

from Oklahoma. They plan to start June 19. To win a wager of \$500 made by the boys' father, Colonel Jack Abernathy, and Frederick Thompson, the boys must saddle their ponies in the Atlantic surf and unsaddle them in the Pacific.

Banker Discharged.

NEW YORK, June 10.—After hearing this morning, Magistrate Harris discharged Thomas Lattimer, Pittsburg banker; John Phillips and Henry Derider, of England, held on fugitive warrants here on charges of defraud-

ing H. H. Stelsbaum of Pittsburg. The arrests were made at the instance of the Pittsburg police. It was alleged that Stelsbaum was defrauded of \$2000 in the proposed purchase of his West Virginia coal lands for \$12,000,000.
