ARE DEVELOPING HOME STAKE MINE

Captain Clark and Associates are Rapidly Getting Things Into Shape Preparatory to Undertaking Much Work—Past work Unsatisfactory.

Captain Clark and associates who have bonded for Dr. C. R. Ray the Homestake mine near Woodville, are rapidly getting things rounded into shape preparatory to making extensive developments at the mine. The machinery at the mine has all been overhauled and a new pump and larger motors have been put in which will facilitate the working capacity. Seventeen or eighteen men are now employed in and around the mine and as soon as things open up more will be put on. At present Mr. Jayne, the superintendent, is simply prospecting, with a view to determine just where the mine should be opened up and is driving cross-cut tunnels to cut the vein in different places with that end in view. The work that has been done at the mine in the past is of a very unsatisfactory nature and if the ore bodies are continuous and the values remain after development the men in charge will put in a much later improved treating plant and the work will be pushed just as rapidly as labor and capital will permit.

In the past the mine has undergone a series of gophering and again money has been spent, with a rather lavish hand, very much in the wrong direction it seems. The vein lies between a contact of slate and porphyry and has all the earmarks of the making of a good mine. In width it varies from eight inches to three feet and values to the extent of from \$6 to \$150 per ton have been found.

The main ledge is unbroken having been traced for a distance of several hundred feet on the surface and the walls where they have been struck are perfect. The whole country is very highly mineralized and several veins carrying some values intersect the main lode continuously.

Mr. Jayne is cleaning out old drifts, stopes, etc., and some ore has been taken out that will be put through the mill as a test run and if it is found that the ore is rich enough to justify milling any amount that is lying around on the different dumps will be gathered up and put through the mill, thereby lessening the running expenses of the development work.

Massam Called to Europe.

ARE DEVELOPING NIGHT RIDERS OF IDAHO CAUGHT

Six Warrants Are Issued by Federal Court Charging Conspiracy to Defraud the Government Out of Lands.

BOISE, Idaho, June 10.—Sensations are promised by government officials when six alleged night riders of prominent ranchmen of the Camas district are brought to trial on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government of valuable lands and encroachment of their rights.

The men were arrested on bench warrants issued by the federal court. They are:

E. C. Griswold, Charles M. Johnson, Harry McAdams, Marvin Wilsley, James and Roy Hanford and Jerry Herpie. Following arraignment they are at liberty today under heavy bonds.

Their arrest created a sensation. It has been known for months that the Gammas Prairie settlers had been terrorized by a band of masked men who adopted the Kentucky night rider tactics and threatened to kill, or

tar and feather land claimants who refused to do their bidding.

The government charges that an organized gang operated to secure title to valuable land tracts upon which settlers had filed entry and that they used violence and threats to carry through the alleged plot.

Federal secret agents have been working on the case since February when Joseph Vaughan, a settler, killed E. V. Emmons, a man said to be in sympathy with the riders. Vaughan, who was acquitted of murder, on the stand asserted that many settlers had gone away owing to threats of death while others who had remained had been tortured but feared to notify the authorities for fear of vengeance to come.
