

PEACE TO COME SOON TO MEXICO

Former Governor of Sinaloa Reaches Los Angeles—Declares That He Feels No Bitterness Against Rebels and is Satisfied.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 13.—"Peace will be established in Mexico within one month," was the prediction made by former Governor Diego Redo of the state of Sinaloa, who arrived in Los Angeles this afternoon from Mexico. The fact that he was forced to resign his governorship at the point of a bayonet, and his comrades at arms were executed after the capture of Culiacan he declares he has forgotten. He says that he entertains no bitterness for the rebels and that after a short visit here he will return to Sinaloa and as a private citizen do all in his power to benefit Mexico.

"Our men," he said are laying down their arms in great numbers and returning to their families. "With a force of only 400 men we defeated Culiacan against a force of rebels amounting to 2000 under General Aguilar, for six days. The loss of life was fearful. When there no longer appeared to be hope we surrendered rather than fight our way from the city and leave the women unprotected.

"While I might have left the city immediately I remained for six days to arrange the affairs of state so that there would be no disorder, when Governor Celso Gaxiola Roja should take charge. During that time I walked the streets of the city and at no time was any disrespect shown me by the people."

"Do you think the movement in Lower California will cause Madero trouble?" he was asked. "You call it a liberal movement," he asked in reply. "We call it anarchy and it will be suppressed without difficulty."

POSTAL TELEGRAPH TO ENTER TELEPHONE FIELD

NEW YORK, June 13.—With the completion of two new lines, costing \$2,000,000 between Salt Lake and San Francisco, it was announced today the Postal Telegraph Cable company is to enter the telephone field in competition with the American Telephone & Telegraph company. Successful experiments have just been completed, it is said, demonstrating the practicability of using the new lines for both telegraph and telephone business simultaneously. While the telephone tests between Salt Lake and San Francisco were being made, the same wire was being used for the duplex transmission of telegraphic messages between San Francisco and Chicago.

IGNORED THREAT: SALOON WRECKED

Two Dynamite Explosions Throw Hundreds of Chicago People Into Panic—Black Hand Society at Work.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 13.—Hundreds of persons were thrown into a panic early today by two dynamite explosions, occurring simultaneously, and caused, it is alleged by members of the Black Hand Society. Ignoria Lottisanto, a wealthy saloon keeper, recently received a demand that he pay \$500 under threat that his property would be destroyed. Lottisanto showed the letter to Sam Remilla, another saloon keeper, who said he had received similar demands. Neither paid any attention to the threatening letters. At 3:15 o'clock this morning Lottisanto's saloon was wrecked by a terrific explosion of dynamite. While an immense crowd gathered, Remillas place, nearby, was blown up by a similar explosion.

YAQUIS DEMAND TITLE TO MEXICAN LAND

EL PASO, Texas, June 13.—Declaring that they were promised lands in Mexico now owned by the Richardson Construction Company of Los Angeles and in which John Hays Hammond and Henry Taft are prominently interested, the Yaquis have prepared to fight unless given title to the property. The insurgents in detroning Diaz, The Richardson Construction Company assert that it has a clear title to the land. MARIE, Ont., June 13.—The case of Mrs. Angelina Neapolitana, under sentence of death for killing her husband, will not be considered by an extraordinary session of the Ontario parliament. A. C. Boyce, member of parliament, who had interested himself in the woman's case, when he learned that she was about to become a mother, today received a letter from Minister of Justice Aylesworth, saying that it was impossible to have the lawmakers convened. Boyce had written asking for clemency for the woman. Aylesworth's reply also said that the governor general would not consider the case so far in advance of the execution.
