Medford Falls Onto Osborn's Slants and Bingo! Such a Waloping Was Administered the "Champions"—Twas a Great Medford Day.

Medford, 13; Grants Pass 6. This tells the story of the contest at Grants Pass Tuesday. The Invincibles took to Osborn's curves like a duck does to water and when the slaughter was over the Invincibles had 20 hits to their credit.

In the first frame the home guard garnered four runs on a series of hits and errors and came back with one more run in the third. Grants Pass pushed two scores over the plate in the sixth and two in the seventh inning. Medford did not score again until the seventh when they took two more tallies and to show that it was not an accident chased six runners over the home plate in the final frame.

Pug Isaacs was the center of attraction with a home run in the first inning and another in the ninth. "Shorty" Miles made an effort to do likewise but had to be content with a three bagger, a double and a single. Wilson made three clean hits and Gill came out on top of the heap with five safeties.

Medford ran into a neat triple play in the fifth and this is about the only solace the Grants Pass players have. Pug drove a Texas leaguer at Osborn who nailed it and heaved it to Williams at third, who in turn doubled it to Wechsler at second. The bosses were full at the time and a hit would have meant more core.

Hitless wonders, lucky dubs or anything else they may be called, the Invincibles certainly struck their gait and gave the bunch from the Pass the worst drubbing they have taken this year.

CRATER LAKE LAUNDRY BURNS

Flames Destroy New Institution—Think Fire Started in Engine Room—Loss Is Estimated at \$5000—Partly Insured.

Catching fire from some unknown cause at 11:45 Tuesday night the Crater Lake Laundry, 620 North Central avenue was completely gutted by the flames before the fire department gained control. When discovered the fire had gained considerable headway and only by prompt work on the part of the fire boys was any part of the building saved. None of the contents was saved.

The loss is placed at \$5,000. J. W. Anderson, owner of the building places his loss at \$2,500 and carries \$1,200 insurance. The laundry fixtures are valued at between \$2,500 and \$3,000 and are protected for two thirds of their value.

The fire is thought to have started in the engine room. J. Forbes employed as a washer was the last person to leave the building, as far as known and reports every thing apparently in good condition when he left the place at 8:30 o'clock.
