

LARGEST SHIP AFLOAT SAILS

New White Star Liner Olympic Leaves Southampton On Her Maiden Voyage — Has Tennis Court, Bowling Alleys and Pools

SOUTHAMPTON, England, June 14.—In an attempt to break the world's record for speed across the Atlantic, the new White Star Liner Olympic, the largest and finest vessel in the world, sailed at noon today from the new dock here on her maiden voyage.

In order that the big vessel might not be delayed a minute on her maiden voyage and become a "hoodoo ship" the officers of the White Star Line temporarily conceded the demands of the striking sailors and coal passers. The Titanic, sister ship of the Olympic, which was launched at Belfast, Ireland, two weeks ago, will be ready to enter the Southampton-New York service late this year. Although the Olympic and Titanic easily surpass for size and speed the Lusitania and Mauretania of the Cunard Line, they will soon themselves be eclipsed. The mammoth turbine impeller, now building for the Hamburg-American line is 398 feet in length, or 7 1/2 feet greater than the Olympic and Titanic.

The Mauretania now holds the westbound trans-Atlantic record of 4 days, 10 hours and 41 minutes for a passage between Queenstown and New York.

The Olympic is 882 1/2 feet long and 92 1/2 wide and has 45,000 register, being considerably larger in all respects than the Lusitania and Mauretania. The new liner is the most magnificently furnished and equipped vessel afloat, among the innovations being swimming pools, a tennis court, a bowling alley and Turkish and electric bath establishments.

The departure of the Olympic was a gala occasion. American Consul Albert Swalm and the mayor of Southampton visited the ship. They bade Captain Smith an official God speed. Thousands cheered as the vessel cleared from her dock. Scores of vessels in the harbor saluted the big liner with their sirens.

BAT NELSON SHOWS UP AS A DEBATER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—Batting Nelson and Bud Anderson, aspiring pugilist, who thinks he can lick the Dane, went fight in Vancouver, Wash., July 4. That much is certain today following a conference between the fighters on one side and the ministers, vestrymen and a few business men of Vancouver on the other. Nelson showed himself to be good at debate, and put some questions concerning the boxing game that remain unanswered yet, but his opponents had the law on their side and held firm.

It is probable that the proposed bout may be pulled off either near Vancouver or in Clackamas County, Oregon. If assurances are made that the authorities will not interfere with the bout.

1000 CARS APPLES IN GRAND VALLEY

GRAND JUNCTION, Col., June 14.—The Grand Junction Fruit Growers' association has made a new estimate of the 1911 crop for Grand valley, and places it at 1000 cars of apples, 150 cars of pears and 250 cars of peaches.

This is a slight increase on former figures, but generally the estimate is considered too low. E. P. Taylor, the county horticulturist, estimates at least a two-thirds crop, while the association figures at but 50 per cent. A requisition has been made for 1500 cars to handle the crop, but the probabilities are that the shipments will be above that figure. The estimate is for a 20 per cent crop of Winesaps. Ben Davis, Gano and Missouri Pippin, which at first were believed to have been damaged badly by the frost, are now showing up in fine shape, and will make an 80 per cent crop. The apple crop from Fruita and Clifton is figured at about 75 per cent. These two towns will probably ship the largest percentage of the Grand valley crop this season.

The first cherries are ripening, and shipments by express have been made to Denver and other Colorado points. The aggregate cherry shipments will not be large. Strawberries are also in their prime, but they are mostly consumed locally or in western Colorado.

MASONS MEET IN CONVENTION

Grand Lodge Called to Order by Grand Master Wolverton—Will Not Conclude Its Work Until Friday Afternoon.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—With 200 delegates present the Sixty-first annual convention of the Masons was called to order this forenoon in the Masonic temple by Grand Master Wolverton.

The convention is not expected to conclude its work until Friday afternoon.

Immediately after convening the exercises of formal receiving the representatives of other jurisdictions were carried through. The annual address was delivered by Judge C. E. Wolverton, the retiring grand master.

Miss Parsons resigned the assistant superintendency of primary schools at Brockton, Mass., to establish the farm garden system in England. She is the author of many books for children, and has been associated with her mother and her brother, Harry G. Parsons, in school garden work. A large bouquet of roses was sent the traveler by children of the primary schools of Brockton.

Six months will be devoted by Miss Parsons to her work in England, and she will then return to this country to take up important educational work in Denver, Col.
