ALLEGED CHECK ARTIST CAUGHT

Man Who Is Said to Have Victimised Eagle Point Firm Lodged in City Jail Pending an Examination—Wrote Check for \$5.

Bennie Stewart, accused of presenting a worthless check for \$5 to Cineade & Ashpole, confectionery dealers of Eagle Point, some two months ago, was apprehended in Medford and now rests in the city jail pending investigation.

Steward wandered into Eagle Point early in the spring and bluffed the proprietor of the Owing hotel into the idea that he wished to purchase a half interest. He stayed there for two weeks and left without paying his board bill. Before leaving he purchased some goods from Cineade & Ashpole and saying he was "broke" he wrote a check for \$5 on the Jackson County bank. It was afterwards found that he never had a deposit in this bank.

Steward was not heard of again until Thursday morning when Ray Ashpole, who is also a deputy sheriff, came to Medford and saw him walking down the street. The fellow saw him at the same time and hurried south on Front street and into Cane Bros' saloon where he was found immediately afterward by Ashpole and Officer Cineade. He was taken to the city jail and will be tried upon the return of Prosecuting Attorney Mulkey.

Ashland to Pave.

ASHLAND, Or., June 15.—As a result of bids for bitulithic paving in Ashland opened by the council at the last meeting the Warren Construction company, who are engaged in a contract now in force, were awarded the contract for additional work at the same figures heretofore paid. The contract covers the improvement of parts of Second street, Third street, B street and Sherman street. The matter of paving Mechanic street from Main street to Hellman street was considered and it was decided to lay the pavement 36 feet wide.

An ordinance was passed providing for the improvement of Mechanic street from Main street to Hellman street, and the council also adopted a resolution providing for the improvement with bitulithic pavement of A street from Sixth street to Ash street.
