

ED EXTENDS AN OLIVE BRANCH

Local Booster Calls On Grants Pass Newspaper and Urges a "Get-Together" Movement - Pledges Support to Mining Convention.

(Rogue River Courier.)

Ed Andrews visited Grants Pass yesterday as the official representative of Medford, and came bearing gifts—denying that they were gifts of the Greeks, that no Trojan horse filled with men and knives was stationed without the gates.

Mr. Andrews visited the Courier office and said:

"I come as the representative of Medford and am instructed by the people and business men of that city to say that they want to get closer to you and expect to come in a special train to your mining congress."

"We will be glad to see you," remarked the Courier, "provided you do not attempt to take the whole works away with you."

"No; we want to be your friends and want to co-operate with you," said Mr. Andrews.

"Well, if that is correct, it will be the first time Medford ever sought to co-operate with Grants Pass on any proposition," remarked a representative of the Courier. "Is it because we are about to enter upon a healthy mining revival, arranging for extensive irrigation and doing other things along the lines of material prosperity that Medford wants to warm up to Grants Pass?"

"Oh, no," said Mr. Andrews.

"We heard some of the Medford people made an attempt to turn incoming mining men from Grants Pass to Medford, that Medford was the 'logical headquarters' for all this mining region; in other words, Medford tried to seize the glory and some increment from what rightfully belongs to Grants Pass and Josephine county," said the Courier. The Medford man said "Oh no" again.

These jests aside, Mr. Andrews discussed the future in an earnest way. Medford could not have sent a more competent and broader man on this mission as Ed Andrews at all times is for the development of the entire Rogue River valley and all of its towns, and no narrow selfishness can find room in his mental makeup. He is one of the best posted men on the resources of southern Oregon, and whenever he speaks he has something of interest to say.

Mr. Andrews spoke of his mission as follows:

"There may have been cause for complaint in the past regarding your suggestions, that is that Medford did not co-operate with Grants Pass and other towns of the valley, but we did not mean it in a selfish way. We were so busy with our own enterprises and local development that we allowed ourselves to appear indifferent. But it was only appearance, not a reality.

"Our business men got together a few nights ago and we talked this matter over, and decided that the time had come when co-operation should develop. We appreciate your decision not to hold a celebration on the Fourth of July and want you to go in a body to our celebration. We, on our part, intend to charter a special train and come to your mining congress. There will be a large number of enthusiastic Medford people on that train, and we know that we will be welcome in your midst.

"Medford is glad to see the near fruition of your great irrigation enterprise; when this is under way you will have the greatest country in the world.

"Josephine county is rich in mineral. So is Jackson county, and co-operation of these two rich domains should be the watchword. By this means much mutual good can be accomplished.

"As I remarked before, we extend a genuine welcome to all of the people of Grants Pass to be with us on our two days of celebration, July 3 and 4, and you may publish it broadcast that Medford will be with you, and will come a-shouting, when the mining congress convenes July 18."

Have Much Gold

NEW YORK, June 15.—With a bag of gold nuggets to gladden the eyes of the "folk in the old country," Stephen O'Donohue and Patrick O'Donohue will depart for Ireland in a few days. They are going to their home in Wexford town.

They are the owners of a mine in Bolivia for which they have just received more than \$1,300,000. Two brothers remain on watch at the property.

Ten years ago Stephen O'Donohue, now 33 years old, went out with English prospectors and obtained work in a tin mine two days' journey from La Paz. Soon he sent for his brother Patrick. Years were lost. Then came word of an abandoned tin mine that could be purchased, and the two young men raised \$5000 and took title. The mine proved to be exceedingly rich in gold as well as tin. It had been worked by the Indians 300 years ago, the brothers said. The mine is in Amaya Pampa, Chavanta.
