Melville when he appeared at the Three Mile house late yesterday afternoon, according to Mrs. Strubel seemed highly elated over his escape and appeared to consider the whole affair a lark. The lad said he was convinced that escape in the open was impossible and at once planned to evade the posse by stealth. He left his hiding place at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and succeeded in getting into the creek bed unobserved. He crawled slowly down the hill and waited until he was sure he was unobserved before he made his way toward the Three Mile house.

### NEW COUNTERFEIT BILLS IN CIRCULATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—The treasury department today issued a warning against two new counterfeit bills which have been discovered in circulation by the secret service. One is a \$20 gold certificate on lithograph bond paper and the silk fibre is imitated by ink lines. Defect in the portrait of Washington will be found on close inspection. The second is a \$10 United States. It bears the portraits of Lewis and Clark; if of good color but is too heavy printed.

### PAPER MAKER TO FACE TRIAL

Charged With Attempted Bribery in Connection With a Contract for Paper for the United States Postoffice Department.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—Peter Thompson, millionaire paper manufacturer of Hamilton, must stand trial for attempted bribery in connection with a contract for paper for the postoffice department he was trying to secure. Judge Wright in the supreme court of the District of Columbia today overruled a motion for a demurrer filed by the attorneys for Thompson and ordered that the case must go to trial. Thompson, who is president of the Champion Coated Paper company, it is alleged, sent a \$100 bill to Major Zantinger, who was at the time passing upon samples of cardboard submitted for sale to the postoffice department.

### JAPANESE POURING INTO PHILIPPINES

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—As a result of unofficial information from Tokio, the attention of the state department has been turned upon Japan's activities in carrying out what is apparently a definite policy of expansion in the Philippines and South America. The Mikado, it is asserted, has decided to pour immigrants into the Philippines, and 150 have been sent to Manila on each steamer. The Brazilian minister of agriculture has permitted the establishment of a Japanese colony at Muniqueiro Campo, in the Amazon valley. The colony is to be founded by a Japanese syndicate, which the government is supporting. The Japanese line Nippon Yusen Kaisha, is preparing to build three new 7500 ton liners to use in the American trade. These ships it is pointed out could be easily converted into transports and auxiliary cruisers.
