**SEAMEN'S STRIKE SOON TO END**

**Compromise Offer is Made by Steamship Lines and Accepted—Sailors Will Get a Raise of Ten Shillings a Week.**

LONDON, June 16.—All indications today point to a settlement of the British seamen's strike within a few hours. The compromise offer of an increase of 10 shillings made by the White Star, Canadian Pacific, Lamport and Holt lines has been accepted by the union. Other lines are expected to make a similar offer.
