"GHIZZEH," THE GREAT PYRAMID OF EGYPT.

Free Lecture Which Will Be an Enjoyable Treat, at the St. Mark's Hall, Sunday Afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Chicagoan Thinks Northwest's Show-ing Will Be Only Half Usual Size—Is on a Tour of the Northwestern fruit districts.

A rare treat is in store for all Bible students and thinking people of this city in the world-famed Pyramid lecture of J. A. Bohnet, V. D. M., of New York, who is now touring the Pacific coast under the auspices of the International Bible Students association.

The ancients recounted seven wonders of the world, and at the very head of the list, named the Great Pyramid of Ghizeh. It will be a surprise to many to learn that this immense structure, the largest in the world, is not of Egyptian origin; that it was not intended nor never used as a tomb, but was intended to be a wonderful teaching in its lines and measurements, and that scientific men have declared that the pyramid could not be produced today with the aid of modern machinery, even with the original for a pattern.

It is commonly known that the exterior angles and dimensions teach the profoundest scientific truths. But it is a fact that so well understood.

GAS FRANCHISE IS REFUSED BY 'DADS'

Boardman Company Retires From Klamath Falls and City May Build Plant—Regulation of Rates Proves Efficient Barrier.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., June 16.—The council has refused to grant the W. F. Boardman company of Medford another gas franchise, and representatives of the corporation have announced that the company will withdraw from the local field. This means that for the present the city will be without gas.

Some weeks ago the corporation appeared before the council and asked for a 50-year franchise. The franchise was granted, but the city reserved the right to regulate the rates to be charged for heating and lighting purposes. The company let the franchise go by default, but asked for another, permitting the city to regulate the rates to be charged for lighting purposes, but not for fuel purposes. The majority of the council felt that the term of years was too long, especially without having the right reserved to the city to regulate the rates for any and all purposes.

An effort is being made by taxpayers to bond the city to install a municipal gas plant. It is argued that the city would then be in a position to enter into competition with the lighting company and bring about a general reduction in rates charged for electric lights.
