Representatives of Realty Association and Commercial Club Will Appear Tonight Before City Council to Discuss Question.

WHITE SLAVER IS GIVEN FIVE YEARS

Woman Who Was Found Guilty of Interstate Traffic in Girls Sentenced to Jail—Made Practice of Enticing Girls Into the Net.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 20.—Found guilty by a federal jury of interstate traffic in girls for immoral purposes, May Brown was today sentenced to five and a half years in the Kansas state prison. When sentence was pronounced by Judge Page Morris, the Brown woman, fainting, physicians were hastily summoned and revived her. As soon as she regained consciousness she went into hysterics and for an hour screamed steadily until opiates were resorted to. She was sent to the Kansas state prison because there is no provision for women prisoners at the Leavenworth federal penitentiary.

Conviction was in the specific case of Cora Frohm, who was placed in a resort in Pocatello, Idaho. The girl escaped and in spite of threats of death went to her home and told her mother of her experiences. At her home it was believed she had been with a theatrical company.

Testimony brought out at the trial showed that the Brown woman had made a practice of securing employment in department and candy stores and other places where young girls were employed. She formed acquaintances with attractive girls and took them to night cafes and afterward to her apartments where she introduced them to men who enticed them into resorts.
