TURKEY DROPS WAR AT WORD FROM POWERS

SOFIA, Turkey, June 21.—Due to the concern that Russia, England, Italy and Montenegro are taking in the war that General Torgut, commander of the Turkish forces, is leading against the tribesmen of Northern Albania, word has been received from Constantinople by Torgut to stop activities, irrespective of the outcome.

Trouble with Russia has only been narrowly averted due to this war, and Italy, England and Montenegro are becoming nervous over the situation.

MARICOPA PRACTICALLY WIPED OFF THE MAP

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., June 21.—The town of Maricopa in the Sunset Oil fields, 55 miles west of here, was practically wiped out by fire yesterday, according to reports received here. Captain Fred W. Ball of the volunteer fire company is reported dead and many others injured. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

\$100,000 FIRE IN SEATTLE FACTORY

SEATTLE, Wash., June 21.—An early morning fire in the manufacturing district resulted in damage exceeding \$100,000. The fire started on the third floor of the Seattle Cracker and Candy Company's factory and gutted the two upper floors. It also damaged the stocks of the West Coast China Company. LAUGHS AT SIDIS' CRITICISM OF PARENTS

NEW YORK, June 21.—Asserting that Professor Boris Sidis' criticism of modern school methods results from ignorance and is not substantiated by facts, Professor F. R. Bachman, assistant superintendent of Cleveland public schools has answered the treatise on child culture written by the father of Harvard's boy prodigy. "Such tirades as that of Dr. Sidis usually carry their own answer," said Professor Bachman, "but it is due to the teachers to say a word for them. It is only partly true that present day teachers are careless girls or irate old maids. The majority of teachers are consecrated, earnest men and women. As to the argument that children are becoming more backward, Dr. Sidis' facts are all wrong. Records today show children are entering higher schools and colleges at earlier ages than they did 25 years ago. Many of Professor Sidis' charges are too absurd to answer."

DEAD GRASS NOW HIGHLY DANGEROUS

Campaign Is Urged to Have Department Burn Grass On Different Vacant Lots—Fourth Will Be Dangerous If Grass Remains.

Fearing the approach of the Fourth of July which will be observed three days in Medford, owing to the areas of dry bunch grass in the city, which is highly inflammable, local business men are planning a crusade to have the city put a crew of six fire boys at work burning the grass over the city on vacant lots. It is pointed out that a week's work would lessen the danger to a degree where it would be hardly noticeable.

Last year much of the grass was burned by the fire boys, working without pay. They think that this year they should receive some consideration for the work.

A crew of six men could go over the city and armed with a few hundred feet of hose burn the grass with safety. Then the danger of fire during the celebration would be greatly lessened.
