

POSTAL BANKS ARE PROVING POPULAR

Percentage of Deposits Grows—Individual Average Now is \$33.39 Throughout the United States—Report is Issued by Hitchcock.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—A statement issued today by Postmaster-General Hitchcock shows that a total of \$390,666 was deposited in the first 48 postal savings banks in the first month of their operation.

The second group of 45 depositories, which opened for business May 1, received in the first month \$70,749 in deposits—14.47 per cent more than was taken in at the initial offices during the first month's operation.

The reports received from the depositories are so encouraging that the prediction is made that by July 1 deposits will have reached \$1,000,000.
