Meira of Medford closed the afternoon services with "Our Christian Heritage."

C., June 21.—That President Taft will open a law office in Cincinnati after he leaves the White House and there, with his son Robert, build up a practice which the younger man will carry on, is a report that is creating wide discussion here today. That he contemplated this plan was intimated at the luncheon at the Chevy Chase club at which the president was entertained by members of the Cincinnati Commercial club. The intimation of the plan was made when the president was humorously discussing the problem "what shall we do with our ex-presidents," but those who heard him today assert he was in earnest.

HORACE HAVEMEYER SAYS DAD WAS PHILANTHROPIST

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—Horace Havemeyer, son of Henry O. Havemeyer, testified today before the Hardswick sugar investigating committee. His father's estate, he said, was valued at \$15,000,000. Of this, \$8,000,000 was in sugar stock and the rest in real estate and railroad stock. He testified that he did not now own any sugar stock and that he did not want any. He defended his father's manipulations of the common stock of the National Sugar Refining company of New Jersey referred to yesterday in testimony by James H. Post. He read a letter from the directors of the trust asserting that no funds of the American Sugar Refining company had been used in financing the consolidation.

PUBLIC MARKET MOVE STARTED

Committee of Council Now Considering Matter—Its Benefits Are Set Forth in Communication to City Officials by Realty Association.

The proposed public market for Medford received a hearing before the city council Tuesday night but no definite action was taken. Mayor Cannon said that the matter required a thorough investigation which would be given it as soon as possible.

The Natorium grounds have been tentatively offered for that purpose by H. C. Kenner, one of the stockholders and would make an ideal location for the market, being centrally located to the surrounding truck gardeners and convenient to the business district.

A communication on the subject from the Medford Realty association was read by J. C. Brown who set forth the benefits to be derived from such an institution. The communication read as follows:

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Medford: Whereas, we, the Medford Realty association, are interested in the best welfare of Medford, and we realize the present means open to the producers of foodstuffs in this valley for the sale and barter thereof are inadequate, we wish to present for your consideration these facts, viz:

The production of vegetables and produce in the past has been so irregular and inadequate that our merchants have been compelled to contract for regular supplies from California and other sources.

Now, however, our production is increasing rapidly, and as a result with a double supply pouring in, the merchants yet favor the contract supplies in cases of doubt, with the result that many producers cannot dispose of their goods. In the past they had open to them the course of
