

ALL SHOULD RALLY TO CLUB' SUPPORT

Over \$3000 in Dues Delinquent—Names to Be Made Public Soon—Everyone Should Help the Good Work Along.

To the Editor: At the meeting of the Medford Commercial club, held Wednesday evening, Secretary Boos submitted to the officers of the club, a list of delinquents. Much surprise was expressed to learn that the club should have a delinquent list of over \$3000. This list showed many of Medford's best "believed to be" booster and loyal citizens. Now, if Medford is going to uphold its reputation as a live, progressive city with a Commercial club that has the reputation of doing original things in development and promotion work, and ready to back up such ideas with financial support, she must have citizens and members of the Commercial club, who do more than talk loud, and leave it to the other fellow to foot the bills.

This list shows really who the loyal people of Medford are, that are giving a mite toward maintaining the supremacy of Medford, and keeping it in the bright limelight of the world at large by supporting the bone and sinew of the city, its Commercial club.

The list also shows who of the many "enterprising" appearing citizens in the city and valley are not giving a helping hand or doing their fair and proper share in bringing increased development and prosperity to Medford and to themselves individually.

During the month, a number of the members who are loyal and public spirited, and to whom much of Medford's prosperity is owing, called upon the merchants and citizens, who were thought to appreciate the valuable work of the Commercial club in the past, and ask for a subscription to maintain the high standard which Medford has given to the commercial world. It is needless to say that many welcomed the "subscription" committee, and again placed their imprint for a continuance of the monthly subscription and dues; but too many were encountered who are of the side-stepping sort, who are always ready with some flimsy excuse, and who in the past have let the other fellow bear the load of obligation, which has been the result of increased business and enhanced values of his property. Now, it is certainly not fair to allow such a condition to go on, every business man knows that this is a bad state of affairs for everybody in Medford. The Commercial club must continue to be a real "live wire, necessary to our city juts as much as our postoffice, banks and city administration.

Every one should help, and not permit the burden to fall upon a small number of our people who are of the deserving and enterprising class. This list of delinquents contains names with averages as high as \$60 and \$75. Persons who are fully responsible, but who find pretext or excuse to avoid paying. Some say, "if you had come around monthly, I would have paid my dollar, but now the bill is too big." Others make the excuse when called upon to subscribe a small amount for publicity work, state that they feel grieved for not being asked to become a member, or find some other means of crawling out.

The Commercial club is not a closed corporation, it is not a social organization. Every white, law abiding citizen is welcome to join its membership. In fact it is his duty to belong, and therefore should not wait to be asked or invited. The club belongs to him as much as it does to the older members, who have been so successful in building up this community, and through whose effort and loyalty so many who are not members nor lending their support, are deriving great benefit.

The officers of the club on seeing the list of members in arrears on account of dues and subscription, decided that it was but just and proper to present the true situation to show the public spirited men really are, and accordingly instructed the secretary to have the list of members in arrears read at the next open meeting of the Medford Commercial club to be held on July 5. It is to be hoped that many of the lax members will get out their check books and balance their accounts to which they have obligated themselves, and will realize the need of their co-operation in the work which the Commercial club seeks to do for the future growth of Medford.
