Besides, it will fix the race track in perfect condition for the horse races, and the six mile speedway for the automobile races. The ladies' relay race is going to be a contest in real earnest. The friends of the contestants, both at Talent and Griffin Creek, are prepared to back their favorites to the limit. Horses are being groomed for the occasion, five horses to each rider. There are good entries for the running and trotting races.

Cars all the way from 36 to 96 horse power are already entered for the automobile races. H. L. **GIVEN DEED TO KLAMATH FALLS**

Local Lodge of Elks Sent Warranty Deed of City—Over One Hundred Members of the Local Herd to Invaade Falls and Help Institute Lodge
