

GEORGE AND HIS QUEEN APPEAR

Make Royal Progress Through the Streets — Sixty-Five Thousand Troops Patrol the Line of March as the King Passes.

LONDON, June 23.—To the thundering cheers of a multitude of subjects their majesties King George V and Queen Mary III today made their royal progress through the streets of the central and southern portions of the city. This was their majesties' first appearance since they were crowned yesterday.

The procession was a mile in length. It included detachments from every English regiment, from the navy and marine corps and from the Indian and colonial contingents of the army gathered for the celebration.

As the procession left Buckingham Palace the Royal Horse Artillery, gathered in St. James Park fired a royal salute. The crown prince Captain Fitzwilliam led the procession with a band composed of sailors, the Royal Marine Light Infantry and the Household Cavalry.

Enthusiasm greeted the scarlet and golden oakleaf uniforms and plumed hats of Field Marshals Lord Roberts, Sir Evelyn Wood, Lord Grenfell and Sir Charles Brownlow.

Heralds and trumpeters in crimson and gold and Life Guards preceded the royal coach. Eight cream colored horses drew the vehicle. The king, glimpses of whom could be caught as the ponderous old coach wheeled by was dressed in the uniform of a field marshal, while by his side, garbed in pink, sat the queen.

The royal couple was accompanied by the Prince of Wales, dressed in the uniform of a cadet. The Duke of Connaught rode at the right of the coach. Lord Kitchener rode at its left.

The entire line of march had been most gaily decorated for the occasion.

Little Enthusiasm. From a military standpoint the progress was magnificent but not as much enthusiasm was aroused as had been expected. The lowering skies and threatened rain had caused the throng to be smaller than anticipated and the stand-owners were selling seats for what they could get.

TRYING TO MAKE BETTER CITIZENS

Governor West Deals With His Plan to Improve Condition of Convicts, Hoping Thereby to Make Better Men of Them.

SALEM, Or., June 23.—In dealing with the men behind the prison walls Governor West faces the fact that almost all of them must some day be set free when they have served their terms, and believe it is safer for them to go out feeling the state has tried to help them than to go on cursing the gates that swing behind them.

"Today we begin shipment of brick to Corvallis to be used by the state agricultural college for building purposes. This year \$25,000 worth of brick will be turned out by unguarded convicts, and not one of them has escaped or tried to escape.

"This is the most trying season of the year," continued the governor, "to one who is confined. The newspaperman feels like running away to the hills, the banker craves to get out of the four walls of his bank. I feel as though I would like to be free from office duties when the weather is so fine. In the same way this is a most tempting time for the men at the penitentiary. They know they can sleep in the open air and find much food if they want to run away.

"In the face of all this we send them out on their first trial to work in the state lands around some of the institutions or on the roads. We pay them practically nothing, but make them distinctly understand that we are giving them an opportunity to prove their manhood. If they withstand the temptation to run away, we know they possess self-control and are worthy to take the next promotion, which is parole to go out and work for themselves, all the time remaining subject to the state, and that if they violate any law they are to be brought back to confinement. In this way the state maintains its grip upon them."

Personally Governor West cares little for criticism of his prison policy because he is sure he is doing right, but he expresses regret that his opponents should make political capital out of a reform movement. "Because of 'base poor fellows out there whom I am trying to help and make men of,'" he said today, "I regret the present agitation."

Under the "bull pen" system as high as 26 men have escaped in a single year. Only two from a much larger number of trusted men have attempted to get away under the new system. This showing is demonstrating the success of the system and only a few scattering, timid and misinformed ones have ever expressed fear of these paroled men. The general sentiment is that the man who has been given kind treatment and trusted is less dangerous than the man who has been cursed and guarded at the point of a gun until his term is ended and then turned out to be pounced upon by the first police officer whom he chances to meet.
