

MUCH INTEREST IN AUTO RACES

Splendid Sport Will Start Early on First Day of the Celebration of Fourth in This City—Many Entries to be Made.

Great interest is being taken in automobile races to take place here on July 3rd. The class race which will comprise of cars rated from 10 horse power and under will start promptly at 8:30 a. m. Several local cars have entered and many others from Grants Pass to Edge-wood, California have made inquiry as to ruler governing the race and the condition of the course.

The class race totals 50 miles owing to large field of stock cars to pick from should bring a large number of entries.

In the free for all race several high-powered cars have entered and there is talk of some 30 horse-power cars making a try for first money. Grants Pass has high hopes of winning the free for all and the committee received inquiry over the phone today regarding the class race, and were told that they could make arrangements with the driver wanted they would work night and day to get their car in condition.

The free for all race is 60 miles and will start promptly at 12 o'clock noon July 3rd.

The course is 5 miles in length, making 10 laps to class race and 12 laps to the "free for all," and should prove interesting to the spectators.

The course will be well patrolled and checkers will be stationed at every turn and cross road. The streets on the course will be roped and all the cross roads closed and the committee are making every effort to provide for the safety of the spectators and the drivers.

Work will begin on the roads Monday and the officials in charge has assured the committee that they will be in good condition before the end of the week.

The full list of entries will be published Wednesday and the committee hopes to be able to name the officials by that time.

ART C. BURGESS GAME WARDEN

Sam L. Sandry Appoints Local Man to Place Vacated by Charles Gay, Resigned—Says He Will Enforce Law.

Art C. Burgess has been appointed deputy fish and game warden for this district by Sam L. Sandry, chief deputy fish and game warden for Douglas, Josephine, Jackson and Curry counties. Mr. Burgess has assumed his new duties and is being shown about the district by Charles Gay, whom he succeeds. Mr. Gay having resigned the office, owing to other business interests.

Mr. Burgess had the recommendation of a number of prominent business men in this city. Mr. Sandry in appointing him informed him that if he was found neglecting his duty in any way that he would be removed. Mr. Sandry has started out on a regime of strict enforcement of the game laws and states that his deputies must all make good.

Mr. Burgess stated Saturday that he wanted the aid of all sportsmen in the county in the enforcement of the law and would like to have any cases of its violation reported to him. He stated further that he expects to treat friend and foe alike in his efforts to enforce the game and fish laws.

GOLD ORE FOUND ABOUT WOODVILLE

Phil Robinson of Woodville is exhibiting samples of gold ore discovered by him recently, which he claims to be the richest vein yet discovered. The specimens are sprinkled with gold and will run several thousand dollars to the ton. He refuses to divulge the location of his find, except that it is in the vicinity of Gold Hill.

The Homestead mill near Woodville has concluded a run of more than usual richness. The new management have been conducting a test of the ore taken out of the upper workings and are more than satisfied with the showing made.

Chinese Best Sailors

LONDON, June 24.—A great outcry throughout all England was recently raised by a statement by a big firm of ship owners giving as a reason for employing Chinese instead of British sailors the fact that orientals are more sober and industrious than their own countrymen. Much evidence was produced to disprove the charge against British seamen. Today, however, the British board of trade issued statistics showing that during 1909-10, one English sailor in every 2073 died from alcoholism as against only one oriental in every 14,381 employed on British ships.

OLD AGE AND YOUTH AUTO TOURIST ESCAPE; MAN HURT

Runaway Team on Roosevelt Avenue Tosses Babe, Grandmother and Father into the Ditch—Man is Only One Injured.

Frightened by the breaking of king bolt, a team owned by Roger W. Hitchcock of Eagle Point, driven by Elmer Keyes, ran away on Roosevelt avenue Saturday afternoon and were not stopped until they had passed the McAndrews ford. Keyes was painfully injured, but his wife, daughter and mother-in-law escaped with little injury.

According to the usual laws governing such an affair, Keyes, who was injured, should have escaped, as he was the strongest and best fitted physically for endurance. Mrs. Keyes had been ill recently and was in a frail condition. The child was but two years of age, while Mrs. Collins, the mother-in-law, was 73 years of age. Yet Keyes was the only one sustaining injuries.
