

URGES DAIRYING FOR THIS VALLEY

J. D. Heard Returns From Automobile Tour of Northern California and Tells of the Wonderful Dairy Farms of That Section.

That more attention should be paid to dairying and intensive farming is the belief of Jeff D. Heard who returned Sunday from an extensive automobile tour throughout northern California, visiting Fort Jones, Etna and Callahan among other places.

"Throughout Scott's valley," states Mr. Heard, "I found but one ranch for sale. All of the farmers are making much money from dairying and the growing of grain and vegetables. The valley, as large as this, is very prosperous, and is dotted with fine homes.

"I believe that should more attention be paid to the growing of small stuff and to poultry, dairying and the like that the Rogue River valley would be far more prosperous. We can learn a great lesson from northern California."

Mr. Heard was accompanied by Mrs. Heard and his daughter, Miss Gladys.

SPRECKLES TELLS ABOUT FORMING SUGAR TRUST

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 26.—Before the Hardwick committee of the house, which is investigating the sugar industry, John D. Spreckels declared that he was president of the Western Sugar Refining company, the Spreckels Beet Sugar company and the California Sugar Refining company. Asked if the Western company had been formed to eliminate competition, Spreckels replied:

"Not exactly, but for a year before the Western was organized there had been three price cutting."

The story how, by a contract lease, Spreckels, in 1903, took over the contracts of the California-Hawaiian Sugar company, his principal competitor, for three years and closed the refineries of that company after the concern had lost \$600,000 yearly in trade war, caused the committee to instruct Spreckels to file a copy of the lease.

WEIGHT OF PARCELS TO ISLANDS INCREASED

PARIS, June 26.—On and after July 1, the minimum weight of parcels by postal between France and the United States, the Philippines, Porto Rico and Guam will be increased from four to ten rounds.
