

HENWOOD CASE GOES TO JURY

Court Packed With Women All Eager to Hear Details of Life of Wealthy Female for Whom Double Murder Was Done.

DENVER, Col., June 28.—Before a court packed with women, all eager to hear details of the secret life of Mrs. John S. Springer, the wealthy woman in the case, Judge Whitford today read instructions to the jury which is trying Frank H. Henwood for killing George Copeland in an affair here in which he also slew Aviator "Tony" von Phul of St. Louis.

Attorneys for Henwood took exception to some of the court's instructions but the curiosity of the woman for the inside history as to the connection of Von Phul, Henwood and Mrs. Springer was very sparingly gratified.

Argument for the state is being made by District Attorney Elliott who will close, and Assistant District Attorney Chiles, while Attorney Bottom will present Henwood's case. It is not believed the lawyers will conclude in time for the case to go to the jury before night.

FARMERS SWINDLED IN BUYING EGYPTIAN CORN

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 28.—A crusade against swindlers who are selling wheat grains to farmers for seed with the statement that they were obtained from Egyptian mummy's caskets has been started by the department of agriculture. According to the department officials, a grain of wheat is dead after 10 years.

TRIES TO REACH CRATER; FAILS

Despite the warning of people along the route and the information that they could not reach Crater Lake by automobile at this time, owing to the snow, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Henderson of Portland attempted to make the trip Sunday and failed. They arrived and left Wednesday morning for California.

The party motored from Portland, arriving Friday. Saturday they drove to Prospect where they were informed that the trip would be impossible. However they attempted it. Three miles beyond Whiskey Creek they got in the snow too deep for progress and were forced to return. They spent the night at the Rangers Cabin on Union Creek.

ENLARGE POST AT VANCOUVER

Probable That Barracks at Spokane, Boise and Walla Walla Will Be Abandoned and Army Centered at Vancouver.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—As far as can be ascertained at present, the Vancouver, Washington barracks, will probably be enlarged and there is a possibility that Fort George Wright, at Spokane, or Fort Lawton, at Seattle, or both may be abandoned as a result of General Leonard Wood's scheme of doing away with smaller military posts throughout the country, according to unofficial statements of department officials here. Boise, Idaho, barracks may be abandoned also, it is said. None has a regimental garrison.

Officials state that the program of concentrating the troops will not affect coast defense stations, with their limited garrisons, or the Alaskan posts.

Congressional opposition to the scheme is already apparent, but it is not expected to amount to much as the plan is in the hands of the war department, and does not require any authority from congress.

HARVARD LOSES ITS GOLD LACE

Scarlet Coats of National Lancers Missing for the First Time in 73 Years—Governor Foss Refuses to Parade—Meyer Given Degree.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 28.—For the first time in 73 years Harvard's commencement was held today without the glory of the National Lancers, whose scarlet coats and gold lace have been the feature of similar past events.

Governor Foss was responsible for the omission of the time honored feature. He declined to appear with the lancers in the commencement procession from Massachusetts Hall to Sanders theater. The governor was escorted only by five dismounted members of his staff. The graduating class is the largest in the history of the Harvard.

The honorary degree of doctor of laws was conferred on secretary of the navy George Von L. Meyer and on Joshua Royce of Grass Valley, Cal.
