Medford Fans Will Have Chance to See Baseball, Tennis, Racing, Golf, Shooting, Swimming and Other Games During Next Few Days.

Medford fans are due to have their sporting blood appeased during the next few days, no matter what their favorite game might be—shooting, baseball, golf, tennis, horse racing, auto racing, swimming races, boxing, bronco busting and several other forms of pastime are presented. There will be something doing every minute after the ball starts rolling.

The events will open at the Country club Friday afternoon when the Kickers handicap golf tournament will be played over the new course of the club. Those who care little for golf and more for shooting will at the same time indulge in a shooting match for a handsome sterling challenge cup. This match will be held on the grounds of the club. A tennis tournament is being arranged for the members of the club, also on their new courts.

MORE JAPS FARMING IN ROGUE VALLEY

M. Hiroko who recently leased a considerable acreage from George A. Morse, off the old E. K. Anderson place on Anderson creek, has leased another 15 acres from Mr. Morse off the old Van Dunlap place north of Bear creek. Mr. Hiroko has 52 acres under cultivation, most of it in tomatoes, and the balance in cabbage. An invasion of cut worm in the tomatoes was killed off with poison before doing a great deal of damage. Nine Japanese have been employed, but two were turned off Saturday. Mr. Hiroko has contracted his tomatoes to the local canneries at \$12.50 per ton and his cabbage at \$11.50 per ton. The Ashland Canning Preserving company will take care of considerable of the product, says the Valley Record.
