\$175,000 PROFITS IN SINGLE TRIP

White Star Liner Olympic, Biggest Ship Afloat, Carries 1205 Cabir Passengers—\$60,000 in Food and Drink Aboard—Meat Bill \$15,000

NEW YORK, June 30.—When the White Star liner Olympic, the largest vessel afloat, sailed for England Wednesday at 3 o'clock she carried 1205 cabin passengers, 737 of whom were first class. The vessel's profit for the round trip will be \$175,000. Food and drink value at \$60,000 were loaded aboard the new ocean leviathan before she departed on her first eastward trip. About the same sum will be spent to fill the larder and the ice box each time the Olympic lands here.

The Olympic's meat bill amounts to \$15,000. The refrigerators are stacked with beef, pork, lamb and veal. Poultry costing \$5,100 was also purchased. The fish bill was \$2,000. Wines and spirits worth \$5,000 will be drunk by the passengers and \$2,000 worth of cigars will be smoked.

HENWOOD GUILTY SECOND DEGREE

DENVER, Col., June 29.—Frank H. Henwood was found guilty this afternoon of murder in the second degree for killing George Copeland in a fight in the Brown Palace hotel bar, when S. Louis Von Phul of St. Louis also was killed. The jury retired at 10 o'clock last night. The speed with which the verdict was reached occasioned considerable surprise.

DENVER, Col., June 29.—The jury in the case of Frank H. Henwood, on trial here for the killing of George Copeland in an affray in the Brown Palace hotel in which Aviator "Tony" Von Phul was also slain, began their deliberations this morning.

After getting the case last night the jury went immediately to bed. Today they are debating three possible verdicts—first or second degree murder or acquittal.

As Copeland was killed by Henwood inadvertently by a bullet of the fusilade which he fired at Von Phul, his rival for the affections of Mrs. John Springer, it is doubted if the jury will find a verdict of murder. Many expect a disagreement.

CHINA IS FORTIFYING STRATEGIC POSITION

VICTORIA, B. C., June 29.—Fainchiang, in northwestern China, a strategic point of great importance to China in event of hostilities with Russia, is being hastily fortified, according to advices brought by the steamer Panama Maru, which arrived from the orient today. Russian newspapers in Manchuria are daily printing alarmist reports of alleged aggressive preparations by China. Chinese troops are pouring into north Manchuria and Mongolia, it is said, and the Chinese government is evidently making ready for war.

LUMBER CAMPS CLOSED THROUGH FEAR OF FIRE

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 29.—With the closing of the lumber camps in Clark county early in July, between 500 and 700 men will be brown out of employment. Officials of several big logging companies say they are closing down operations on account of the danger of forest fires during the summer.
