

# PLANS FOR TWO COURT SESSIONS

### Copies of Lafferty Bill Dividing Oregon Into Two Federal Judicial Districts Received—Medford Sessions to Open Sept. 1 and Dec. 1.

Copies of the bill introduced in congress by Congressman Lafferty providing, among other charges, for two terms of federal district court at Medford, have been received here. In part the bill reads as follows:

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, That there shall be, and hereby is, created an additional judicial district in the state of Oregon, said state being hereby divided into two judicial districts of the state of Oregon. The eastern district shall include the counties of Baker, Malheur, Harney, Grant, Union, Wallowa, Umatilla, Morrow, Sherman, Gilliam, Crook, Wheeler and Lake, with the waters thereof. The western district shall include the residue of said state of Oregon, with the waters thereof.

Section 6. That the regular terms of the district court of the United States for the western district of Oregon shall be held at the city of Portland beginning on the second Mondays of March, July and November, and at the city of Medford on the first Tuesdays in October and December in each year. That the regular terms of the district court of the United States for the eastern district of Oregon shall be held at the city of Baker beginning on the second Mondays of April and November and at the city of Pendleton on the first Tuesdays in June and December in each year.

Section 7. That the marshal and the clerk for both the western and eastern districts of the state of Oregon shall each appoint, in the manner provided by law, at least one deputy at Medford and one at Pendleton, respectively, who shall reside and maintain their respective offices at each of said places.

### ROYAL INDIAN PRINCESS ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

BOMBAY, India, June 29.—Sudrani Bhagwan Kaur, known as the Ranees Sahiba, charged with having killed her lover, Kahan Chand, a Brahmin, today faced the beginning of her second trial for murder in the chief court of the Punjab. The Ranees is of a rank equivalent to a princess in the Punjab royal house and the possibility of infliction of death upon a woman of such prominence has caused excitement and aroused all India to protest.

### PROCESSION OF HOLY SACRAMENT IN SPAIN

MADRID, June 29.—The procession of the most holy sacrament, the most important and spectacular feature of the international eucharistic congress, was held today following a solemn pontifical mass. The Spanish royal family was represented and the route was lined by troops. Ten thousand members of the Nocturnal Adoration society were present from Spanish provinces. The procession was the finest of its kind ever witnessed here.

### GENERAL ELECTION BEING HELD IN AUSTRO-HUNGARY

VIENNA, June 29.—The second election for candidates who failed to get a majority in the general elections held in Austria June 13 was commenced today. The Christian socialists, or anti-semites, heretofore the predominant party in Vienna, is not popular in this election and indications that nearly all the candidates in the capital will lose their seats. The Marrian socialists on the other hand have made consistent gains throughout the country.

### TOBACCO TRUST PLANS ANOTHER REORGANIZATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—Instead of filing an application for a rehearing today, it is expected that the tobacco trust will submit a plan for re-organization. Attorneys for the corporation have been consulting with Attorney General Wickersham and it is said they have devised a plan which meets with his approval.

### Jao Tariff for Formosa.

TOKIO, June 29.—Formosa's tariff schedules under the old act governing imports expired today. In the future the entire Formosan tariff will be made to correspond with the new tariff of Japan.

The girls were all dressed in white and many of the boys were in uniform. They made a grand impression on the two hundred and fifty thousand people that witnessed the procession. The most apt figure that I can think of to illustrate the crowd is a large band of sheep, all going one way, for as I was going from E. Morrison to Hawthorn avenue I had to face the crowd, the sidewalks and street were literally crowded and the police were kept busy trying to keep the vast sea of human beings back so that the street cars could pass and they were not only loaded but packed and men hanging on the outside on every available spot. Well after working my way through the crowd, for I wanted to go in the opposite direction from that the crowd was going, to where I could get a phone I tried to call up one of the two brother-in-laws I have in the city, I finally succeeded in finding one of them and he told me that his family was out of town and would not be home until after the evening electric parade and that I better go to the other brother-in-laws, as he knew that a room in the city that night in a hotel was out of the question, so

# BUILD TRAIL TO GOLD STRIKES

### Plans Under Way to Construct Path From Kerby to Headwaters of Chetco River Where New Prospects Are Located.

Samuel Bowden has spent several days in Grants Pass, coming in from his mining headquarters on Canyon creek, five miles west of Kerby, says the Courier.

Mr. Bowden states that plans are under way to build a first class trail from Kerby due west to the headwaters of the Chetco river and Baby-foot creek, in which region is located Higgins' Golden Dream mine. Mr. Bowden informs the Courier that from Kerby to his place, a distance of five miles, he has put the trail in fine condition. From Bowden's on west the trail is rough. Work will be continued putting this portion in shape, and when finished, there will exist a trail of a total length of 18 miles, which, in the language of Mr. Bowden, "will be the finest and smoothest pack trail in the western states."

This trail will open to mining men and prospectors the rich mineral region to the west and will be of vast benefit to the mining industry of the county. The trail crosses the Illinois river, Josephine creek and Canyon creek. Bridges span the two latter streams.

None of these ledges have been developed to give an adequate idea of the amount of ore or width of ledge at depth, yet the assays show what class of ore exists on Canyon creek, and in the opinion of Bowden, who has given 30 years to mining in various parts of the world, the district will prove one of the richest in the west. "All it needs is development," says Mr. Bowden, "and with real mining some of those ledges will make riches for the owners."

Bowden will bring a display of telluride gold ore from his properties to the mineral display, which will be a feature of the mining congress in Grants Pass, July 18.
