

COUNTRY CLUB HAS OPENING

Reception to Visitors Feature of the Day and Social Event of the Summer Season—Golf Links, Tennis Court and Shooting Grounds Ready

The formal opening of the new Medford Golf and Country club this afternoon is one of the most gala social events occurring in many years in southern Oregon. A hundred club members are entertaining friends from all sections of the county and the entertainment furnished is on a most elaborate scale. Sports are featured, the shooters, golfers and tennis players being active. At the club house a large committee is welcoming the visitors and showing them about the grounds and house. Refreshments are to be served and everything done to make the occasion one long to be remembered.

The country club is certain to prove one of the most enjoyable features in the life of a Rogue River valley business man or orchardist. One hundred acres of land are given over to the making of a splendid place of recreation and on the highest point, a site which overlooks the entire valley, has been erected a clubhouse, modern in every respect with a huge roof garden over all where one can sit and enjoy an incomparable view of the surrounding country and no more pleasing landscape lies in God's great out of doors than the one to be seen from this point. Directly in front of the house the valley sweeps down and away. Dotted as it is with homes and broad stretches of orchards, interspersed with fields of grain and alfalfa it is truly beautiful. To the south Wagner Butte towers up towards the clouds. To the north majestic rock is seen. No better location could have been chosen.

The club house is well fitted with all of the comforts of life. A buffet, kitchen, dressing rooms, lounging rooms are all provided. A huge fire place promises comfort on stormy days. Nothing has been overlooked. A nine hole golf club has been laid out on the north and west side of the club house where the golfers may drive and tramp to their heart's content. On the south side of the club house a tennis court is ready for the players while down at the foot of the rise on which the house stands on the north side the traps have been placed where the shooters may congregate. All in all it is a splendid country club and reflects much credit on its builders.

SOLDIER'S WIDOW WEDS COLONEL SECRETLY

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 30.—The marriage of Lieutenant Colonel Robert F. Ames and Mrs. Madeline Janney, which occurred June 8, was made public today with the information that they are now in the east on a wedding trip.

Mrs. Janney was the widow of Lieutenant C. W. Janney, who killed himself March 12, 1910, in the Philippines. The suicide occurred at the home of Colonel Ames, where the Janneys were dinner guests. A courtmartial exonerated Ames of any blame in connection with the affair.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. W. C. Sherman at the home of the bride's brother, R. T. McKisick.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—A report recommending the dismissal from the service of General Consul Michaels at Calcutta and Disbursing Clerk Morrison of the state department for suspected grafting in connection with payment for a portrait of former Secretary of State Hay was adopted by the house committee on expenditures in the state department.

STEAMER SUNK NEAR QUEBEC

Aranmore Rams the General Wolfe and Latter Goes Down in Thirty Fathoms of Water—Crew and Passengers Saved.

QUEBEC, Que., June 30.—The steamer Aranmore, a few miles below Murray Bay, in a dense fog, early this morning ran down and sank the steamer General Wolfe. Both boats were owned by the same firm, Holliday Brothers, of this city. Those on board the General Wolfe report that they saw nothing, even from the deck, of the other ship until the shock occurred. The Aranmore struck the Wolfe on the starboard side, causing her to swing around, and then, after the recoil, struck her again on the port side.

The General Wolfe sank in 35 minutes and now lies in 30 fathoms of water. She carried down with her valuable cargo 250 or 260 cases of salmon destined for the United States, specially bought up by a dealer for the Fourth of July market. Both ship and cargo are insured.

Immediately after the shock both vessels launched their lifeboats and all passengers and crew of the General Wolfe were rescued and brought up to town this morning by the Aranmore, which had been on her way down coast.

Most of the passengers of the wrecked vessel were residents of the coast. Among them were seven nuns. Some of these were rescued only with difficulty.

OPERATION PERFORMED ON TRAIN WITH SCISSORS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 30.—Delegates to the American Medical association in convention here are talking today of an operation performed with a pair of scissors by Dr. James Eaves of London, England, while en route from Denver to Los Angeles. A passenger recovering from an operation was suffering great pain, his wound having closed too soon. Dr. Eaves had no surgical instruments with him and as the man's condition was critical, he borrowed a pair of scissors. The scissors were sterilized, the patient stretched on a berth and while the train was in motion the operation was successfully performed.

THREE AIRSHIPS FOR ANNAPOLIS ACADEMY

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—Three aeroplanes costing \$13,000 and representing the latest development in aeronautics will be delivered tomorrow to the naval academy. The machines are of the Curtis type and will form the foundation of Uncle Sam's aerial navy.
