GRANTS PASS AT OUTS WITH ESPEE

Railroad Plans to Plant Freight Depot Across Street So as to Avoid Another Crossing and Citizens Are Indignant Over It.

GRANTS PASS, Or., June 30. -The city of Grants Pass and the Southern Pacific railroad may have to settle their differences in court. The Southern Pacific some time ago built a new passenger depot in the eastern part of town upon the company's fight of way. According to the understanding, this structure was to have been placed between Seventh and Eighth streets, but when it was licated on the opposite side of the fight of way in direct line with the ground on which Seventh street must be extended to cross the track, the citizens were so glad to have a new depot that objections were hushed.

Now, however, the company is planning to move its old freight depot northward, setting it across Fifth street on ground that will be needed for a street connecting the two sides of the town. This is regarded by the eftizens as too much, for they declare that if allowed it will eventually retard the growth of the town.

At present only two streets connect the business and residence districts and they are not sufficient to accommodate traffic. To prevent the proposed action by the company a mass meeting has been called in the Fourth ward to prepare a protest to the city council.

Once expensive buildings are erect ed across these prospective street rights of way, it would bankrupt the town to condemn the property for streets later. The action of the railroad company is not taken because there is not plenty of room, but be cause the fewer streets are opened the less the chances for accidents for which the railroad would be liable.

For some time the council has been negotiating with the company to open Fourth and Fifth streets, but little has been accomplished.
