

### \$4000 IN PRIZES FOR THE FOURTH

Ashland, Grants Pass and Other Rogue River Valley Towns Making It Possible for Medford to Pull Off Most Successful of Celebrations.

Medford's neighbors, Ashland, Grants Pass and other towns in the valley, are making it possible to Medford to pull off the most successful celebration and Fourth of July carnival that has ever been witnessed south of the Umpqua divide. The various committees have taken hold of the thing in earnest, and instead of \$1000 in being given prizes, as stated on the bills, there will be nearly \$4000 expended towards making this celebration a success.

**Ladies' Relay Races.** One of the important attractions will be the ladies' relay race. Different localities have chosen their champion riders, and are backing them with good strings of horses and competent helpers, to assist in the five changes that are to be made during the race. Miss Sleppy of Talent, who won the relay race two years ago, is the favorite of her district, as well as part of Ashland. Mrs. DeRoboam of Jacksonville is in daily training, and her friends say that the lady that wins first prize over Mrs. DeRoboam will have to ride some.

The automobile race has been filled, and the people will have a chance to see what a 90-horsepower machine can do, stripped the frame and manned with a fearless driver who is out after first money.

**Horses in Training.** At the track there are now a lot of good horses in training, some from northern Oregon, and some from California. Besides, there are local horses which are going to give Medford people something of a surprise. Grants Pass and Ashland people are coming in special trains. The Grants Pass ball team, they say, are going to come off the champion team in the baseball tournament, and give warning to other teams to be prepared to not take defeat too much at heart.

Since the close of the normal, two years ago, he has been in the employ of the government in the forestry service. His headquarters have been at Prospect, a village on the upper Rogue river. Mr. Kerby is a young man of such sterling worth that the government has recently raised his salary. As he was one of the most successful teachers of this county, so he also succeeds in the civil service. The bride is an accomplished young woman and is well known, particularly at Peyton and Eagle Point, where she received her schooling. She is a native of California. The happy couple left on No. 16 train for Medford and will at once go on to Prospect, which will be their home.

### CROWS' NEST COAL STRIKE IS REPORTED SETTLED

NELSON, R. C., June 30.—It is reported here on good authority that a settlement of the Alberta and Crows' Nest coal strike is arranged. The operators, it is said, have agreed to offer day workers an increase of 7 per cent in wages and other concessions not including the closed shop and it is understood that the strikers have agreed to accept the offer. Official announcement of the end of the strike is expected to be made at the beginning of the week.

### TETANUS ANTI-TOXINE FOR USE AFTER FOURTH

ALBANY, N. Y., June 30.—In anticipation of emergency calls for tetanus anti-toxine on and after July 4, the department of health today is notifying city health officials that a large supply of the emulsifying serum is on hand ready for instant distribution. "Victims of explosions and other powder burns should be treated immediately with the anti-toxine," says the health commission. Many cities in the state will hold "sane" celebrations on the Fourth.

### STEPS TOWARD CONTROL OF PUBLIC UTILITIES

DES MOINES, Ia., June 30.—When Judge J. H. Henderson of Indianola tomorrow assumes the duties of the newly created office of commerce counsel, a long step will have been taken toward securing state control of public utilities. He will have as his special duties the defending of the people's rights and may institute prosecution against any public utility corporation to compel it to charge reasonable prices.
