

KELLY KICKED HIS WIFE; BROKE TOES

Shows Poor Judgment in Way He Handles His Better Half, According to Complaint Filed by His Wife Asking a Divorce.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 1.—"Wise guy" though he is in the world of pugilists and prize-ring second, exhibits mighty poor judgment in midnight affrays with his wife, if her divorce complaint filed here today is to be taken at its face value. Kelly's better half declares his judgment so poor that when he kicked her with his bare feet he broke three toes.

"Kelly's" real name, his wife declares in her petition, is James Patrick Curtin. He married her in March, 1908.

Mrs. Curtin declares that the "Spider" came home drunk on the night of June 19, and, dragging her from bed, he held her head downward by the ankles out of a fifth story window, threatening all the while to drop her in the street, lifting her back into the room, Mrs. Curtin declares "Spider" pulled her about the floor by the hair.

"Kelly" has grown rich in the Tenderloin here. His wife declares his income is \$1,000 a month and she asks half this amount as temporary alimony and a restraining order preventing him from disposing of his three saloons until her suit is decided.

PORTUGAL FEARS AN ANARCHIST INVASION

RADAJOS, Spain, July 1.—The Portuguese line of the frontier is completely lined with troops on the lookout for an invasion of monarchists from Spain. When the military concentration began a week ago, it was announced from Lisbon that the provisional government did not take the rumors of an impending invasion very seriously, but were taking precautions to appease public opinion. The way in which additional detachments of soldiers have continued to arrive ever since, however, suggests real uneasiness on the part of the government.

JOHN BULL MAY BE A BANKER

Recent Failure of Large Institution May Lead State to Enter into Business—Collapse of Bank Tied Up \$50,000,000.

LONDON, July 1.—The recent failure of the Birkbeck Bank today has started an agitation in England in favor of the state's entrance into the banking business. The Birkbeck did an enormous business with small depositors, and its collapse tied up \$50,000,000, principally belonging to a class of people who could not afford to lose it. Fifty per cent, indeed was paid out within a few days after the institution closed its doors, but even this was insufficient to prevent a large number of small bankruptcies and an immense amount of suffering.

Agitators in favor of the state bank say that things of this kind should not be permitted to happen, but that they cannot be helped so long as the banking business remains in private hands. It is even suggested that the government take over the ruined Birkbeck, pay off its debts in full—and run it in the future as a public institution. This probably will not be done, but the subject certainly will be taken up by parliament.

MODOC NORTHERN TO RUSH CONSTRUCTION

MERRILL, Or., July 1.—Construction on the Modoc Northern railroad will likely begin on the line from Alturas to Klamath Falls in about six weeks.

The Southern Pacific Railroad company, which is to build the Modoc Northern line, selects on July 1 the extensions to be constructed during the next twelve months, and it is confidently expected the Modoc Northern will be on the list for immediate construction, not solely on account of the bonus Merrill has put up to have work begun before September 14, but because the country is developing so rapidly in the northwest that the Hariman system needs this short-cut line to handle its business at less expense.
