### CONNEAU WINS AIRSHIP RACE

Frenchman Wins \$12,500 in Big European Point to Point Race From Paris to London, Though Vadrine Arrives First at Destination.

LONDON, July 3.—Crossing the English channel today with ten other aviators, Conneau, a French entrant, won the first prize of \$12,500 in the big European point-to-point race from London to Paris. He made the fastest elapsed time.

First to reach Herndon, the official end of the course, today was Pierre Vadrine, who won \$2000 as first in the stage from Calais to London. Vadrine would have been the winner of the big prize but that he was unable to compete in one stage of the race, this making his elapsed time the greatest.

Barra also crossed the channel. Most of the aviators continued to Herndon, six miles north of London, thus covering the 93 mile trip from Calais.

Renaux carried a passenger on his flight. Gilbert made the swiftest trip, doing the distance in 37 minutes and five seconds.

Vadrine arrived at Herndon first, winning the \$14,500 prize he having been winner of four of the seven stages of the race. Great crowds greeted the winner at Herndon and the other aviators, who arrived later, were also roundly cheered.

Train, whose machine killed Minister of War Berteaux at the start of the Paris-Madrid race, was forced to descend between Dover and Shoreham; Gilbert alighted near Dorking, and Renaux and Barra near Eastbourne. All the others who crossed the channel reached Herndon.

PHOENIX, Ariz., July 3.—With a total precipitation of 4.59 inches, Phoenix is recovering today from the most severe rainstorm since 1891. Investigation today showed that the cantaloupe, alfalfa and other crops are practically ruined.

The rain began Saturday and fell continuously until Sunday morning. No less than a dozen adobe houses were washed away and for four after the storm had subsided, nearly every building in the city was submerged in from one to three feet of water. The property loss will run into the thousands.

So far as is known, no lives were lost, although a number of outlying districts, cut off from wire communication, are yet to be heard from.

As today is clear, the water is rapidly subsiding.
