

# MEDFORD WINS FROM PASS 9-1

### Catastrophe Happens in the Second When Pass Makes Three Costly Errors—Thade and Stevenson Show Up Well.

Medford grabbed the first game of the four game series for the championship of the Rogue River Valley from Roper's down valley bunch Sunday afternoon by a score of 9 to 1. The catastrophe happened in the second spasm when five of Hall's prizes crossed the plate after Grants Pass had made three costly errors. The game thereafter was without thrills save when Curly Wilson showed why he was spending seventy cents a day to practice by putting one over the fence for a home run and scoring one man.
