CHANGES MADE CRATER FOREST

A number of changes in the boundaries of the national forests made in the interest of more convenient and economical administration and especially of better protection against fire, have just been announced. These changes have been accomplished by President Taft through a series of proclamations signed at different times in June, but all becoming effective July 1.

Changes were made as follows locally: from the crater to the Klamath 9200 acres, to the Paulina 61,370 acres; from the Siskiyou to the crater, 12,400 acres.

From the Crater national forest, 27,931 acres, were eliminated. The land embraced in these eliminations consist of many small bodies lying along the borders of the forest which upon examination were found to be non-timbered lands or patented lands that could well be excluded from the forest.

WATSON URGES ROAD PURCHASE

Judge Watson of Ashland appeared before the county court Thursday and urged the purchase of the toll road over the Siskiyou. The county court took the matter under advisement until such time as they could look into the title to the road which dates back to territorial days.

A monster petition was recently presented to the court urging the toll road to be taken over by the county.

NO CLUE TO JEWELRY ROBBERS IS FOUND

MILES OF TRAIL BEING BUILT

Crater Forest in Better Shape This Year Than Ever Before to Save It From Devastation by Fire—New Guards Are Put On.

Many miles of additional trails have been constructed this season in various parts of the Crater National forest and new guards are being put on now that the forest fire season is near. The forest is in better condition this year to cope with flames than ever before.

A trail seven miles in length from Imhaha to the middle fork of Rogue river has been constructed. Lodge Pole and Black Bear are connected by a trail as is Clover Creek and Desolation Swamp. Six miles of trail has been constructed in the Applegate district.

A force of men will start next week in opening the old John Day road from Brown's Cabin to Diamond Lake a distance of twenty-three miles. Diamond Lake will some day be a great resort when it is made accessible.

A ranger house is being constructed at Besale Rock and one at Lodge Pole.

ROBERT STRANG HAS A NARROW ESCAPE

Robert Strang has a very narrow escape from being badly injured Tuesday evening when an automobile which he was driving turned over with him while he was turning out on the road to pass a carriage. The machine ran off of the end of a culvert which was hidden by a heavy growth of brush and turned over on its side. JACK LONDON TO VISIT LAKE

Famous Novelist is Now On His Way to Medford From the Coast—Is Coming Overland Driving Four Ponies.

From the lake he will drive through Central Oregon and into Nevada then back to Sonoma, Cal., his home, from which point he started.

Early this summer Mr. London and his wife decided to make an extensive camping trip throughout northern California and southern Oregon. He reached Eureka last week and has just left that point for Crescent City. From there he will drive through the Rogue River valley and after a visit of a few days here he will visit Crater lake and central Oregon.

The entire trip is being made in a large spring wagon. Mr. London is driving four mustang ponies. He is shunning the cities to a great extent and keeping in the country. It is reported that he is getting "local color" for a new novel.

ARE BUILDING 75 MILES PHONE LINE

All Parts of Crater National Forest Will Soon Be Connected With Outside World—Nearly 150 Miles of Private Line Within Forest.

Supervisor Erickson of the Crater National forest has completed arrangements for sending a number of telephone construction crews into the forest next week, to build nearly 75 miles of new line. When they complete their work the government will own nearly 150 miles of telephone lines which will place nearly every portion of the forest in communication with the outside world.

The new lines to be constructed are:

- Butte Falls to Prospect, 27 miles; Prospect to Browns Cabin, 23 miles; Imhaha to Besale Rock, 8 miles; Big Elk to Deadwood, 7 miles; Clover Creek to Buck Lake, 3 miles; Four Mile Lake to Long Lake, 4 miles. In addition to this 10 miles of insulated wire which can be laid on the ground and reeled up for water will be installed from various cabins to lookout peaks, to avoid a loss of time.

The lines will be of great advantage to hunters if they should be lost or injured and can reach a telephone. They are not designed for general use by the public however, except in case of an emergency.
