RAILROAD TO CONNECT WITH OREGON TRUNK (Continued from Page 1.)

would be of little value to the owners unless an eastern connection was made with the Oregon Trunk. As an isolated road it would never be a paying investment. He stated further that as soon as possible the construction work would be resumed. The state of the money market is responsible for the delay.

"The Pacific & Eastern will some day be connected with the Oregon Trunk," stated President Gray, "and that time will be just as soon as we are able to build it. Money conditions have been very bad for a number of reasons this year and without money railroads cannot be built. This was responsible for the checking of the work, not alone on the Pacific & Eastern but in many other sections.

"I do not believe that we will be able to do any work on the extension of the road this year as it is now too late in the season even if we had the money available. But the road will eventually be constructed.

"I am not an entire stranger to the valley," continued President Gray, "although this is my first visit here. I have heard much of your wonderful section and am anxious to acquaint myself with it first hand. I also feel that I will not be disappointed as my information has been spoken in the highest terms regarding the valley and no doubt I shall find all that they have told me true.

"I am here not only to look over the Pacific & Eastern but to learn first hand of Medford and the Rogue River valley. I shall welcome all information regarding them that is offered."

Shortly after the arrival of the party in this city they left on the Pacific & Eastern for Butte Falls in order to inspect the line. They were accompanied by Chief Engineer Gerig. The party will return this evening and President Gray will be tendered in informal dinner by local business men. Covers will be laid for about twenty-five.

Saturday three or four automobiles will be secured and the party taken for a drive throughout the orchard district of the valley. The many resources of the valley of the Rogue will be shown Mr. Gray and he will gather much information of value to a man in his position.

The Rogue River Valley is not entirely an unknown section to President Gray as he is a close friend of Colonel Biddle who owns an orchard tract here. Both Mr. Gray and Colonel Biddle were formerly vice presidents of the same railroad system in the east.

GRANTS PASS, Or., July 7.—H. C. Batham a prominent citizen and ex-county fruit inspector, was indicted yesterday by the grand jury which returned a true bill, which alleges that Batham attempted criminal assault upon Lois Hall, the 12-year-old daughter of W. C. Hall, secretary of the Rogue River Lumber company.

Batham appeared in court upon a bench warrant and his bail was fixed at \$1000.

He is married and lives with his family, which consists of wife and two adopted daughters. He came here about three years ago and has dealt heavily in land deals.

Several months ago it was rumored that his conduct was about to be investigated, and that probably charges would be preferred, but the matter was dropped. He has always been fond of being with young girls, frequently taking a number around in hacks into the country. Prior to residence here he came from Hood River where he has a brother that is a prominent fruit grower of that section. His term of fruit inspector in this country was unsatisfactory to horticultural commissioner and he was finally discharged from his position.

TREATY SIGNED TO STOP PELAGIC SEALING

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 7.—A treaty signed here today by Representatives of England, Russia, Japan and the United States will stop pelagic sealing in North Pacific waters hereafter.

It provides that persons and vessels violating the treaty are seizable by officials by any one of the countries party to the pact. A grand to enforce the treaty is provided for. It proposes the apportionment of the annual proceeds of the killing of seal herds among the governments. The agreement is to be effective for 15 years.

PARIS, July 7.—That the Franco-German controversy over Morocco has again taken an acute turn was evident here today when Ambassador Cambon arrived from Berlin and at once went into conference with the heads of the foreign office.

On his return to Berlin, Cambon will at once notify Germany that France opposes the continued occupation of Agadir by Germany, and will demand an explanation of the presence of German warships there. Agadir is a port on the southern coast of Morocco.

FRANCE FIRM AGAINST GERMAN AGGRESSORS

PARIS, July 7.—Ensign Conneau of the French army, flying under the name of Andre Beaumont, today won the European circuit aviation race by flying its last stage, from Calais to the Vincennes aerodrome, 156 miles, in 3 hours and 25 minutes.

There was nine stages in the 950 mile race. The elapsed time of Con-

neau was 58 hours, 38 minutes and 34 seconds. His actual flying time was 23 hours, 22 minutes and 39 seconds. Conneau's prizes will total more than \$50,000, including \$10,000 given by the Paris Journal.
