Reports late this afternoon place the total number of dead at from 11 to 25 but it will be at least two days before the exact number can be definitely known.

Ninety Survivors Arrive. LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 8.—Ninety survivors of the Santa Rosa wreck, worn out by an all-night vigil and terrible hardships, arrived in Los Angeles over the Southern Pacific railroad at 2:45 p. m.

Most of the passengers were disposed to defend Captain Faria, although a few declared that he had used poor judgment in not letting his charges go ashore during the day-time.

Rescued at San Francisco. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 8.—Bringing only three passengers and 75 members of the crew of the wrecked steamer Santa Rosa, a special relief train arrived here today. Little definite information as to the fatalities caused when the ship broke up on Point Arguello could be learned from the survivors.

The three passengers aboard were L. J. Burnham and wife of Berkeley and a Miss Gallagher of San Francisco. They stated their belief that seven passengers were drowned in transferring them by nets from the Santa Rosa to the shore but would not say that, other than Mate Hewson and the three sailors who perished with him, they actually knew personally of any fatalities. They declared that while Captain Faria of the Santa Rosa was very severe during the hours preceding the wreck, they believed he was not to blame for keeping the passengers aboard all day yesterday, as he believed the hawsers from the Santa Rosa to ships standing by would hold.

SEVEN OPERATIONS UPON JOHN W. GATES' THROAT. PAISIS, July 8.—Irrespective of the secrecy maintained at Hotel Maurice, it is known here today that John W. Gates is a very sick man, and his recovery is regarded as doubtful. Five physicians and three nurses are in attendance. Gates has undergone seven operations on his throat.

ENGLAND BARS SPRAYED APPLES

Fruit Sprinkled With Arsenate of Lead Declared Dangerous to Health—Does Not Affect Rogue River Valley Products.

Advice from England, received by local fruit growers, is to the effect that apples sprayed with arsenate of lead will be barred from the market. This will not affect Rogue River valley fruit, as this spray is not used here in the summer months, as it is in northern and eastern fruit districts.

The letter in question touched specifically upon Albermarle Pippins and was written by A. D. Minor, chief inspector of the Manchester markets, Manchester, England, and reads as follows:

"Dear Sir: Owing to complaints having been made against the 'dressing' which has been applied on that brand of apples known as Albermarle Pippin this department has made investigations, with the result that the experts found the deposit consisted chiefly of carbonate of copper and calcium, arsenic was also found to be present."

In many instances the deposit was so abundant as (in the opinion of the experts) to render the fruit unfit for human consumption.

"The department think it of sufficient importance to communicate with the authorities in America, and should be pleased if you would assist by naming the firms or the persons in America who are consigning this brand of apples."
