HOWARD'S PAL SELLS JEWELRY

Tom Howard, who was bound over to await examination by the grand jury, was taken to Jacksonville Friday afternoon and lodged in the county jail as he could not furnish bail. Howard made a partial confession to the officers, but has refused to admit that he actually assisted in the robbery. He states that "Blackie" is the guilty party.

CITY DADS SPEND OVER \$100,000

Huge Amount Makes Up Budget Allowed by City Council at Friday Night's Meeting—Over \$80,000 for Pavement.

The city dads spent over \$100,000 on Friday evening the bulk of which went for paving and service mains. The month was one of the biggest this year. Just \$110,491.64 was allowed in the budget to be exact. The sum was divided as follows:
