SOUTHERN PACIFIC TRAINS NOW RUN TO CHILOQUIN

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 10.—The Southern Pacific has opened daily service between this city and Chiloquin, a point on the road being constructed north from here on the Klamath Falls-Natron cutoff. Chiloquin is about 30 miles from here, and at the railroad bridge across Sprague river. The Southern Pacific has made application for a townsite at that point, and established a station. George Gentry has opened a hotel and livery stable, and others are preparing to establish general merchandise stores. An excursion to Klamath Falls from Chiloquin is announced for July 15. This will be the first excursion on the new road.

HAGGLED OVER PRICE OF SAVING HUMAN LIFE

(Continued from Page 1.) Centralla is said to have replied that it would cost whatever the steamship company thought it was worth; that he was but a lowly mariner and did not care to commercialize the saving of lives.

Local officials of the steamship company deny that its San Francisco office sent such a message. Captain Faria says it is true, and Captain Erickson says he was asked by Faria how much it would cost to transfer the passengers.

Claims no Lives Lost. Declaration that not a single passenger lost his life in the wreck of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company's vessel the Santa Rosa, when she struck on the rocks off Point Arguello was made here today by officials of that line.

In a statement issued by Assistant Wilson in the office of General Passenger Agent Duneen, assertions that twenty-one of the passengers were still unaccounted for were denied.

"When we had finished checking up the list of passengers who were aboard when the wreck occurred we accounted for all but three," said Wilson. "Investigation here revealed that of those three, two had decided not to make the trip and their tickets had been redeemed. The third had taken another boat to Los Angeles."

OLD GUARD OF TEACHERS WIN FIRST VICTORY

(Continued from page 1.) Trustees' reports was taken as a distinct victory for the "old guard" faction and is expected to result in an accession of strength to treasurer Durand Springer, who will be a candidate for re-election.

Despite the strife over the money phases of the convention, the big feature the minds of the delegates is the election of a president. With the resignation today of Nicholas Murray Butler, who has long been their tower of strength, the "old guard" seemed in a quandary who to name for the honor of succeeding Mrs. Ella Flagg Young. Dr. Butler had been mentioned but it is now believed that he is eliminated from the field.

On the side of the "insurgents" various candidates are being talked over, but the consensus of opinion is that all factions ultimately will unite on Carroll G. Pearce of Milwaukee, and that he stands an excellent chance of carrying the day and of giving another "insurgent" president to the association to carry on the work of Mrs. Young.

The most important event of the afternoon will be a general session of the Greek Theater of the University of California at Berkeley at the close of which there will be meetings of active members of the association by states, to nominate candidates for appointment of the general nominating committee which latter body will meet Thursday forenoon just before the election of officers.

LARGEST WARSHIP FLEET READY FOR NAVAL DISPLAY

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., July 10.—Consisting of 35 war vessels, battleships, cruisers, torpedo boats, submarines, colliers and dispatch boats, the largest fleet of American warships ever assembled is here today for the war maneuvers along the Atlantic coast, which begin July 15. In a few days the fleet will be joined by 15 other ships, including the four dreadnaughts Delaware, Kansas, Louisiana and New Hampshire.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 10.—Swelling rapidly in a gentle breeze from the southwest, five big balloons are being filled here today to take part this afternoon in the national balloon race of the Aero Club of America. The inflation of the big gas bags began at 10 o'clock this morning and the start is expected to be made about 5 p. m. Entrants in the balloon race represent St. Louis, Topeka, Kansas City, New York and the United States army, whose big balloon will be piloted by Lieutenant Frank P. Lahm. The two balloons making the longest flights in today's race will represent the United States in the international balloon race, which also starts from Kansas City, October 5.
