We made the run from Prospect to Medford in three and a half hours and outside from a number of chuckholes and stumps the road is in a fair condition."

WOODROW WILSON DOCKED FOR BEING AWAY FROM HOME

TRENTON, N. J., July 10.—Because he was absent from the capital three days in June and had his salary deducted accordingly, Governor Woodrow Wilson is today experiencing much irritation.

When the governor noticed that his check was \$587 short, he called a clerk of the treasury department to have the matter rectified. The clerk declined, saying there was no error, as Senator Ackerman had performed the duties of governor during this absence and the treasury had sent the salary for these three days to Ackerman.

JOHN DIETZ' PROSPECTS FOR FREEDOM BRIGHT

FOND DU LAC, Wis., July 10.—Prospect that John Dietz, "defender of Cameron Dam," may yet go free has brightened here today. Chief Justice Winslow of the Wisconsin superior court, has granted Dietz a writ of error in the trial of his case for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Oscar Harp during one of the battles at the Dietz home.

A bill of exceptions will be submitted by Dietz' attorneys at the January term of court and if a favorable decision is given, the second trial of the "defender" will come next May.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., July 10.—Alexander Bates of Blaine county convicted of stealing two cows, which were identified only by the contents of their cuts, today appealed his case to the criminal court of appeals. At the place where a number of cattle had been butchered, cuts of some of them were found to contain undigested buds of a kind which were found only in the pasture of a man whose cows had been stolen. Bates was sentenced to three years imprisonment.

REQUISITION ISSUED FOR WILDE'S ARREST

SALEM, Ore., July 10.—Governor West today issued a requisition on the governor of California for Louis J. Wilde, the San Diego millionaire. The requisition states that Wilde is wanted in Portland to answer a charge of embezzlement in connection with the unlawful appropriation of \$90,000, the property of the Oregon Savings and Trust Company.
