THOUSANDS ASK FOR CLEMENCY FOR WOMAN

OTTAWA, Ont., July 11.—Whether Mrs. Angelina Neapolitano who slew her husband at Sault Ste Marie, rather than be forced into a life of shame, shall be hanged, go to prison or be set free probably will be settled here Thursday, when the Dominion cabinet will consider her case.

The pressure brought to bear on the government to at least save Mrs. Neapolitano from the gallows has been terrific, hundreds of thousands of names having been signed to petitions from all over Canada and the United States praying for clemency for her.

The impression is general that Mrs. Neapolitano will never be hanged.

COUNTERFEITERS ARE GIVEN SEVEN YEARS IN JAIL

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—Arrested at Oakland, California, Lorenzo R. Inaldi and Amerigo Martinelli are under sentence today to serve seven years at McNeil's Island for passing counterfeit \$5 national bank notes. The men were convicted in federal court here mainly through information given government authorities by Paul Shaver, postmaster at Oakland.

In the arrest and conviction of the two Italians, secret service officials believe they have captured the men who for several months operated extensively with spurious bank notes in this section of the north west. The notes were made in Italy and sent to this country through the mails. One of these letters, containing twenty-six counterfeit bank notes, forwarded from Portland to Oakland was found on Martinelli when he was arrested. Rinaldi was caught at Fresno just after he had received another installment of the same bad bills.

"Nat is a fool to try to break this agreement," said Miss Goodrich. "This trust fund is the only thing that will save him from dying penniless. But his half of the income will assure him of enough to live on the rest of his life."

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 11.—If the first wheat threshed this year may be taken as an indication of general prospects, there will be a bumper crop in this section of Washington. Two thousand sacks of No. 1, forty fold, stored in the warehouse at Lowden yesterday, tests heavy and shows a yield of fifty-five bushels to the acre.

Embezzler Surrenders.

CHICAGO, July 11.—Declaring that he had embezzled \$600 from the Pacific Electric railway, for which he was agent at San Pedro, Cal., a man giving the name of Raymond Duncan, 24, surrendered to the police here today.

The self-confessed embezzler said he was the son of W. B. Duncan, agent for the Southern Pacific at Los Angeles. He claimed drink was responsible for his theft, and that a Los Angeles lumberman induced him to steal.

Wreck Claims 15 Lives.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., July 11.—Between 12 and 15 persons were killed and about 50 injured in the wreck of the Federal Express, east-bound, on the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad near here early today. Twelve corpses have been recovered from the wreckage, which immediately caught fire.

\$50,000 Blaze.

NORTH VANCOUVER, B. C., July 11.—Fire which broke out in the Wallace Shipyards limited, at about 1:20 o'clock this morning, totally destroyed the entire plant of the company, and at 2:30 o'clock the flames threatened the mill buildings of the North Vancouver Lumber Company.

Forest Fires Numerous.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 11.—Continued drought has rendered the forest country of the Ottawa Valley as dry as tinder, and numerous bush fires are reported. The most serious loss thus far was at Eganville, where the fire swept the town, leaving two thirds of it in ashes. The total loss thus far from the fires is in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

City Recorder Telfer Tuesday received a letter from S. A. Kean & Co., bond buyers of Cleveland, Ohio, saying that the bonds had been printed and would soon be forwarded to Medford for signature.

CLEVELAND, July 11.—Vice President Mortimer of the United States Realty company of New York today announced to the National Building Owners and Managers convention here that plans had been drawn for a 100-story building in New York, which is to be 1,200 feet high, the tallest structure in the world.

FIFTY THOUSAND ELKS GATHER AT ATLANTIC CITY

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 11.—Fifty thousand good fellows yelling: "Hello, Bill," and carrying banners have started in to "wake up the town" today. They are delegates to the first convention of the Elks held here. Equal in numbers, if not in noise, is the International Christian Endeavor congress, also meeting here. These two gatherings make a total of 100,000 people, the largest number of visitors ever entertained here.

New Indictments Asked.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 11.—District Attorney John R. Fredericks and Deputy Horton appeared before the grand jury and asked new indictments against B. H. Conners, F. Ira Bender and A. B. Maple, charged with having attempted to dynamite the Hall of Records building.

Western Road Stocks Gain.

NEW YORK, July 11.—The serenity of western railroad stocks was the feature of today's opening market. Union Pacific gained 3-4, St. Paul and Southern Pacific 5-8 and Great Northern preferred 1-2. Otherwise the changes were confined to small fractions. Trading was dull and the market closed firm. Bonds were steady.

MUST WAIT FOR NEW ARMORY

When Requisition is Made on County in Order to Get Work Under Way, Reply is Received That \$7,500 is Not Available Now.

Ashland will have to wait until next year for her new armory, the county court announcing that the \$7,500 appropriated by the county will not be available before January 1, 1912. The message from the court was a surprise to the Ashlanders who had rested easy in the belief that the county's money would be available on demand.

TAFT BALKS AT THE RECALL OF JUDGES

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 11.—The joint resolution for the admission of New Mexico and Arizona was reported for passage today by the senate committee on territories. It is said that president Taft told Senator Smith of Michigan that he would veto the measure if the recall of judges provision were likely to remain in the Arizona constitution.
