EAGLE POINT EAGLETS.

R. Boswell, a concrete contractor of Medford, was out last week looking over our town to see the prospect for a job in his line of business. R. O'Neil, who lives on a ranch near the headwaters of Salt Creek, went to Medford last week to meet his sister, Mrs. William Foales, of New York City, whom he had not seen for over twenty years. They came out on the P. & E. train to Eagle Point and your correspondent took them up to his home. Mrs. Foales was so delighted with the place and the surroundings that she could not find language to express her feelings. The place is situated in a beautiful cove about six miles from Brownboro, and he has about thirty acres in a high state of cultivation, the land being situated so as to be subirrigated, having three large springs on the place, and one of them is so situated that he can irrigate his garden, where he has a variety of vegetables to show for themselves. He is one of our systematic farmers and utilizes all of the manure and consequently has a new crop of hay, wheat and vetch to show for his labor. While I am on the subject of systematic farming, I wish to call the attention of the readers of the Mail Tribune to a circumstance that has occurred in the northern part of the state to which my attention was called while I was on my trip to the Willamette valley. There is a tract of land lying between Fairview, in Multnomah county, and Damascus, Clackamas county, that when I used to travel over it was a dense forest but now is one of the most beautiful spots I have ever seen, being covered, or rather spotted, with farms varying from five to one hundred acres, and the most of them are standing evidence of the value of systematic farming. The most of them are owned by men and women who have for the past ten or fifteen years turned their attention to dairy farming, that is, they have kept cows for dairy purposes and put the offal of the cow barn on the land, and the result is that those who have thus utilized the manure have increased the productivity of the land in some cases over 300 per cent. I will take two places that are adjoining each other in Clackamas county near Damascus to show what I want to impress on the minds of the reader. The two places are separated by the county road, and we will call them Mr. A's and Mr. B's. Mr. A has forty acres that he bought in the brush some years ago and he went to work and cleared a small part of the land and commenced to farm under the old plan but soon had his attention called to the ideas advanced by the professors of the Agricultural College of Corvallis and commenced to act on their suggestions, bought a few good cows and began to put back on the land what he had taken off and in addition a good coat of land plaster that he used in his cow barn. By use of manure and rotation of crops he was able, after clearing and manuring the whole of the forty acres, to keep from twelve to fifteen cows beside his young cattle, one span of horses and hogs enough to eat up the surplus milk, etc. And mark you he has to keep up all of his stock and in addition to keeping all this stock he raises his own fruit and general vegetables besides a quantity of potatoes to sell. He says that his cows have made his farm. Mr. B, on the opposite side of the road, has the manure from his barn piled up alongside of the stable and leaves his land as nature made it, less the substance taken from it by the cutting of the grain, etc. I will call attention to one season's crop of oats to show the con-
