

# NEW FISHWAYS TO BE BUILT

### State Game and Fish Commission Inspect Ladders at Ament and Gold Ray Dams—Fish Getting Over Both Structures at Present.

Members of the state game and fish commission, accompanied by chiefs of both departments as guests of the Rogue River Fish Protective association Tuesday, visited and inspected the fish ladders at the Ament and Gold Ray dams, after which they left on the evening train for Roseburg.

A large run of salmon is now on. Thousands of fish are ascending the stream, and most of them are getting up, though conditions could be improved. The existing fishways are far from sufficient, and are unsatisfactory at the Ament dam, necessitating the construction of a permanent ladder as well as a second fishway at Gold Ray.

### Three Fishways at Ament.

There are three fishways in operation at the Ament dam, one on the south side built some years ago by the state, one through the center of the dam and the temporary ladder constructed this spring by the state paid for in receiver's certificates. Nineteen-tenths of the fish ascending the stream get over the dam by means of this temporary fishway. Some defects caused by the lowering of the toe shallow an outlet into the lake, but these will be remedied at once. But few fish use the ladder in the center of the dam and fewer still the state fish ladder because the fish are attracted by the greater volume of water and pass the mouth of the ladder by without finding it. The water in the state ladder was shut off and only three fish found ascending it.

During the hour or so at most spent at the Ament dam, a constant stream of fish went through the temporary fishway, though Deputy Warden Sandry states that by far the greater run is morning and evening.

### Gold Ray Fishway

The fishway at Gold Ray was pronounced by all members of the commission as the best in the state though it was determined that it should be improved by blasting a deeper channel from the main channel of the river to the base of the ladder, the only defect in the ladder being the difficulty of fish locating it. A great many fish went up this ladder while the commission watched. Another fishway on the south side of the Gold Ray dam will be ordered by the commission, and a permanent fish ladder at the Ament dam. Manager Sanders of the Chicago-Rogue company having stated that his concern intends to complete a model fish company in rebuilding the dam.

Messrs. Finley and Clanton will shortly return and select a site for a branch trout hatchery, probably on Big Butte, where trout eggs can be hatched to restock the Rogue and its tributaries.

### Shown Orchards Also

The commission was taken around the valley in autos and shown the orchards as well as the dams, by Messrs. Hafer, Dudley, Tom Velle, McCullum and Putnam. They were entertained at luncheon at Gold Ray by Colonel Frank H. Ray. In the party were Ed Clanton, master fish warden; J. N. Wisner, superintendent of hatcheries; W. L. Finley, game warden; and the fish and game commission consisting of C. K. Cranston, Pendleton; M. J. Kinney, Portland; J. F. Hughes, Gold Hill; C. E. Stone, Klamath Falls and Mrs. Stone and George H. Kelly of Eugene.

All expressed themselves enthusiastically over the valley and promised hearty co-operation in fish and game protection and propagation for southern Oregon.

### LEE JACOBS IS NEW CASHIER OF BANK

Owing to ill health and a desire to get more open air work, L. E. Wakeman, cashier of the Farmers and Fruitgrowers' bank in this city, has retired until January 1, 1912. Mr. Wakeman will be succeeded as cashier of the bank by Lee L. Jacobs, who has been assistant cashier since the bank opened. R. F. Antle has been named assistant cashier.

Mr. Jacobs is one of the oldest men in point of service connected with local banks, having served in this city for a number of years. He has a host of friends who will be pleased to learn of his promotion. He is also serving his third term as city treasurer.

### MANIAC GUILTY OF 2 MURDERS?

RAINIER, Wash., July 12.—With the arrest of John McQueen, middle aged rancher, at Olympia today, the county officials have secured the first clue toward clearing up the mysterious murder of Archie Coble, aged 25, and his young wife, Nettie, 17, who were found dead in bed yesterday, their heads crushed by an axe.

Before the coroner's jury here today, Frank Bartlett, barber, testified, that he thought that McQueen, who has been in the insane asylum several times, probably wandered into the wrong house and killed Coble and his wife, thinking he was attacking the Bartlett family.

McQueen had made threats against him, Bartlett testified, and followed him through the woods, armed.

### WORRY KILLS EGYPT'S SIRDAR

LONDON, July 12.—Worried into his grave by official cares connected with his position as consul general to Egypt, Sir Eldon Couat died today.

Disaffection to English interests in the land of the khedive, trouble over its money matters and fears of active resistance to British domination there are said to have broken the health of the sirdar.

In court circles it is believed the dead administrator will be succeeded by Lord Kitchener, whose iron hand, it is hoped, will effectually quell the plots of the Egyptian conspirators and defeat the machinations of other powers which have been attempting to under mine the British regime.

LEWISTON, Idaho, July 12.—Indignation is strong here today among members of the Order of Elks against Sheriff Click for his action in raiding the club rooms of the order and seizing a quantity of liquor found there. ### COURT DISBARS CRIPPEN'S LAWYER

LONDON, July 12.—Charged with having published a bogus confession of Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, who was hanged here for the murder of his wife, who was known as Belle Elmore, Arthur Newton, Crippen's attorney, was today suspended from the practice of law for one year by Chief Justice Lord Alverstone, and Justices Darling and Bankes.

Justice Darling declared he was satisfied Crippen had been improperly defended, and that the defense had been conducted largely with a view to furnishing the newspapers with copy who had subscribed financially to the defense.

Newton was also ordered to pay all the expenses of the courts of inquiry. The Law Society of England had asked for his disbarment.
