

WILEY'S SCALP AGAIN SOUGHT

Attorney General This Time Would Decapitate foe of Impure Foods and Fake Nostrums—Matter is in Hands of President Taft.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief chemist of the United States department of agriculture, is the maddest man in Washington today because of reports that he is to be decapitated on account of irregularities in his department.

"I wouldn't advise anyone to wait around my office to see me put out," he said. "There's no telling how long that will be."

Wiley's ire is caused through the personnel committee of the agricultural department, Attorney General Wickersham approving, recommending that Wiley and his assistant chief, W. D. Bigelow, be permitted to resign and that L. F. Kebler, chief of the drugs division, be reduced from an executive position. President Taft is considering the case.

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson said today: "It has only gone half way and is now in the hands of the president. Until he acts there will be no further announcement as to the cause of the move against Dr. Wiley and his assistants."

Wiley said: "Everybody knows that a copy of the charges was served on me about a week ago. I shall reply to them through the secretary to the president. Until the latter sees fit to make a public statement I have nothing to say on the matter."

broken out from the Eagle's tower, where, it is said, the first English Prince of Wales was born. As King George and Queen Mary entered the castle the prince's flag came down and the royal standard of England was blown out from the staff.

In the center of the great courtyard of the castle, where their investiture took place, 1000 of the leading men and women of England and of Wales were seated. The Bishop of Bangor officiated at the ceremony, according to the ancient rites, and as the prince, clad in purple velvet and wearing a sword with a scabbard of purple silk and gold, took the oath wild cheering rang through the ancient walls of the castle.

After the investiture the prince proceeded to the celebrated Queen Eleanor's gateway, which commands a view of the castle square and presented himself again to the view of his loyal subjects, who, 50,000 strong, joined in singing the Welsh national anthem, "Land of Our Fathers."

WINNIPEG, Man., July 13.—The merger of the leading bakers of Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver and Calgary, which has been pending for some months, went into effect July 1, and is now a chartered corporation with a capital of \$5,000,000.

FEEBLE MINDED MAN GUILTY?

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 13.—With a \$1,000 reward offered, half by Thurston county and half by the state for the capture of the murderer of Archie and Nettie Coble, Sheriff Gaston and his men are scouring the county for evidence against Arthur Pierce, a half witted man arrested at Tenino last night.

"Before I heard of Pierce in connection with the murder," said Gaston today, "the people in Tenino told me that he had been acting strange all day. I thought his mind, always weak, had been affected by hearing about the murder."

"When I asked him outright if he had killed the couple, he looked at me shrewdly, and said, 'Well if I did you can't prove it.'"

Pierce will be sweated again this afternoon.

RED CROSS DEMONSTRATION CAR COMING TO ASHLAND

The American Red Cross Demonstration car will visit every town of importance on the Southern Pacific lines during the next two or three weeks. The only object of the trip is to teach the workmen how to render first aid to the injured. The subjects for illustration are selected from among the audience, and one man assumes the part of the injured person, while three others, under the direction of Dr. Shields, demonstrate the first aid work.

After leaving California the car will visit all of the principal towns on the Harriman lines in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Nevada. The following itinerary, arranged by Dr. F. H. Ainsworth, chief surgeon for the Southern Pacific company, will be observed.
